ITEM AND ISSUE: Staff Report on the Investigation of the City of Santa Fe's Application to Re-Permit the Northwest Well as a Primary Production Well Pursuant to Resolution 2013-75

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

On June 11th, 2013 the Board of County Commissioners passed Resolution No. 2013-57 which directed staff to address the following:

1. Research and determine if the protested application for the Northwest Well is for a direct source of supply or as a back-up source of supply to the city well field.
2. Determine if the application before the State Engineer to permit the Northwest Well is consistent with public welfare and conservation.
3. Undertake further hydrologic studies of the Northwest well to determine the potential effects of the well on the local and regional aquifer and how this affects county constituents.
4. Determine if the pending application is in violation of the Water Resources Agreement and the Cost Sharing and System Integration Agreement

Staff has prepared a power-point presentation of preliminary findings.




Purpose of Staff Report

- **Resolution No. 2013-57 directed staff to address the following:**
 - **Research and determine if the protested application for the Northwest Well is proposed as a direct source of supply or as a back –up source of supply to the City well field.**
 - **Determine if the application before the State Engineer to permit the Northwest Well is consistent with public welfare and conservation.**
 - **Undertake further hydrologic studies of the Northwest well to determine the potential effects of the Northwest Well on the local and regional aquifer and how this affects County constituents.**
 - **Determine if the pending application is in violation of the Water Resources Agreement and the Cost Sharing and System Integration Agreement**




History of NW Well (RG-68302)



- Drilled in fall of 1998
- City received Emergency Authorization to use 530 acre-feet during the summer of 2000 from the Office of the State Engineer (OSE).
- OSE allowed the NW well to be used temporarily and only in times of drought until January 2012.
- Max annual withdrawal = 900 af in 2002
- Total withdrawal = 5,377 acre feet past 13 years



Current NW Well Application with State Engineer



- Application for Permit to Drill Supplemental Well to Supplement Ground Water was filed October 24, 2011.
- The application proposes to use up to 900 acre-feet per year from the NW Well to supplement the municipal well field.
- The City seeks to expand the water rights in municipal well field by 1,358 acre-feet above the 3,507 acre-feet historically put to beneficial use.
- Application states “the NW Well is part of the City’s strategy to meet future water demand and will be used conjunctively with the surface water supplies”.



Preservation of Public Welfare

■ Public welfare is preserved by adherence to water management policy described in contractual agreements, ordinances, resolutions and adopted planning documents.

- Water Resources Agreement (2005)
- City of Santa Fe Long Range Water Plan (2008)
- Aamodt Cost Sharing and System Integration Agreement (2013)



Water Resources Agreement (2005)

- Documents that the City and County agreed to use groundwater only as necessary.
- Calls for the development of a joint conjunctive use and sustainability strategy
- Such a strategy shall incorporate shortage sharing and consultation with the County prior to the drilling of new wells.

“The City and County agree to implement conjunctive use management by relying on surface water as a higher priority than the use of groundwater ”

(Section 8 WRA 2005)

1. To date no such strategy has been jointly developed or adopted
2. Though the NW well is not a new well the application is for a permit to drill a supplemental well which was filed without consultation with the County.



City of Santa Fe Long Range Water Plan (2008)

- City of Santa Fe Long Range Water Plan outlines policy and recommends implementation actions related to groundwater.
- The overarching theme is the use of groundwater sustainably.
- Calls for regional cooperation to develop safe yield criteria for aquifer management

The pending application for the Northwest Well does not describe a conjunctive strategy on how it will be implemented or addressed if diverting 900 acre-feet per year is considered a “safe yield” of water from the aquifer.



Aamodt Cost Sharing and System Integration Agreement (2013)

- **The City agreed to develop a conjunctive management strategy in consultation with the Pueblos**
- **The County adopted such a plan in 2009**
- **No such planning document exists for the City.**

“In order to reduce and mitigate the effects of groundwater pumping by the City of Santa Fe on the ground and surface water supplies of the Pojoaque Basin, the City shall develop, in consultation with the Pueblos, a conjunctive management strategy”

(Section 2.6.1 CSSIA)

Shifting pumping of the municipal well field to the north will increase surface water depletions in the Pojoaque Basin



Conservation of Water Resources

Conservation is not only the reduction of current water demand but also relates to the availability of water supply and retention of water rights to meet future demand. The following actions and water planning by the City were evaluated for consistency and feasibility:

- Reduction in potable demand
- Population Projections in Long Range Water Plan
- Projected Water Demand



Reduction in Potable Water Demand

- The City has made diligent efforts in reducing current potable water demand through water conservation.
- Distribution of reclaimed water has reduced water demand and allowed new uses of water. (MRC and SFCC)
- The City just experienced an immediate reduction in demand of 988 residential customers and 54 commercial customers due to the annexation agreement. This translates to approximately 220 acre feet per year.



Population Projections in Long Range Water Plan

- No 40 year water plan, as allowed by statute, exists for the City but the 2008 long range water plan projects a population growth to 2045.
- The 2010 census data and County growth estimates show recent and future growth at a much lower rates than those used in 2008 water plan.
- The recent annexation has reduced the current city customer base by 988 residential and 54 commercial connections.

The projected future city customer base may be much lower than anticipated which will reduce the amount of water needed for future growth.



Projected Water Demand

- The City's Long Range Water Plan estimates water demand as 110 gallons per person per day. This includes residential and commercial uses.
- The 110 gallons per day also includes an additional 15 gallons per person per day in "non-potable" demand.

Non-potable water does not require water rights or additional well production and should not be included in demand projections for the Northwest Well.





Aquifer Analysis

- **Water level data in the vicinity of the Northwest Well, Municipal Wells and the Buckman Well Field were compiled to track changes in water levels over time.**
- **Pumping from municipal wells was tracked and compared to changes in aquifer depth.**
- **Aquifer drawdown due to pumping from the Northwest Well was calculated for three scenarios:**
 - **Maximum pumping from the Northwest Well**
 - **The requested diversion in the pending application**
 - **Drought scenario**



Aquifer Trends for Calendar Years 2009 and 2011



Well Pumping

Worst Case Scenario:

NW Well Pumping at 900 gpm- 24 hours a day-365 day per year- 40 years. (1452 acre-feet per year) This does not include regional aquifer decline...which is estimated at 60 feet in 40 years

45 feet of drawdown 1 mile away
29 feet of drawdown 2 miles away

Application Scenario:


NW Well Pumping 558 gpm for 24 hours per day 365 day per year- 40 years. (900 acre-feet per year)

40 feet of drawdown 1 mile away
24 feet of drawdown 2 miles away

Drought Scenario:

NW Well pumping 900 gpm- 24 hours day during the months of July and August with 10 gpm for the rest of the months for 40 years

8 feet of drawdown 1 mile away

Effect on Agreements

1. The application to re-permit the Northwest Well is not consistent with public welfare and conservation as it seeks to expand water rights in the municipal well field and conflicts with obligations of the WRA and City/County policy.
2. The application seeks to use the Northwest Well as a direct source of supply, not solely for back-up purposes.
3. Use of the well as a direct source of supply could violate ¶ 8 of the WRA *“The City and County agree to implement conjunctive use management by relying on surface water as a higher priority than the use of groundwater”* which could be addressed through dispute resolution language.
4. Use of the well as a direct source of supply could violate ¶ 2.6.1 of the Cost Sharing and Integration Agreement *“In order to reduce and mitigate the effects of groundwater pumping by the City of Santa Fe on the ground and surface water supplies of the Pojoaque Basin, the City shall develop, in consultation with the Pueblos, a conjunctive management strategy”* and ¶ 2.5 of the Aamodt Settlement Agreement.



Current Status of NW Well Permit with OSE

1. The application to re-permit the Northwest Well is currently protested and is in the OSE Administrative Hearing process.
2. Witness reports from the City, protestants and the OSE Water Rights Division were submitted to the Hearing Examiner.
3. The Water Rights Division's report, dated July 28, 2013, recommends the use of the Northwest Well should be allowed only in times of drought.
4. The Water Rights Division's report also finds use of the Northwest Well to expand the declared (subsequently permitted) water right in the municipal well field, over a period greater than 40 years, is not recognized under New Mexico Statute.
5. The OSE, City and protestants are currently in settlement negotiations. If no settlement is reached the matter will go before the hearing examiner, likely in December 2013.




Conclusions

- The pending application for the Northwest Well seeks to expand the current water right in the municipal well field by 1,358 acre-feet with no provisions to limit the use as emergency or back-up supply.
- The nature of the pending application is not consistent with current policy on aquifer management.
- The future water demands estimated by the City are over estimated and include water use that do not require acquisition of water rights.
- Review of water level trends shows the relationship between reduced aquifer pumping and aquifer recovery.
- Use of the Northwest Well as a direct source of supply could violate the Water Resources Agreement, Cost-Sharing and System Integration Agreement, and the Aamodt Settlement Agreement.



Recommended Action

- **Work with the City to update the Long-Range Water Supply Plan to incorporate the framework for a regional conjunctive management strategy that addresses safe aquifer yields, drought scenarios and future water demand.**
- **Partner with the City to evaluate the viability of storing available surface water for use in drought years.**
- **Develop the Comprehensive Joint Conjunctive Use and Sustainability Water Resource Strategy called for in the 2005 WRA.**





Please accept this letter of interest for Santa Fe County's nomination to replace the late Stephen Easley as State Representative in House District 50.

My name is Matthew McQueen. Although I am not a native New Mexican, I have lived in Santa Fe County for over seventeen years, including the last six as a resident of the historic village of Galisteo. I care deeply about all of New Mexico and its residents, and there honestly isn't another place in the world I'd rather live. I have been active in the community, including service on local, regional, and statewide boards and committees. Biographically, I am forty-six years old, an attorney by profession (although I also have degrees in business and natural resources), and I recently got married and am hoping to start a family soon.

If nominated by Santa Fe County and selected by the Governor, I will seek to make New Mexico a better place for all New Mexicans. We can do better than we have in the past. I will work to make New Mexico a place where I, and all of us, can start a family *here*, raise a family *here*, and provide opportunities for the next generation to do the same, all right *here*. I will strive for the equal treatment of all who dwell here without regard to immutable characteristics or personal philosophies. I will promote business and economic development of the type that sustains us without impairing the integrity of our environment, the health of our neighbors, or the safety of our workers. As a lawyer, I believe I can see both sides of most issues, and I will strive to find solutions on common ground rather than debate and discord at the fringes.

If nominated by Santa Fe County and not selected by the Governor, I nevertheless intend to run for the position in the June 2014 primary and November 2014 general election.

At his memorial service, the outpouring of affection and admiration for Stephen made an impression on me. I believe that it is unfortunate for the residents of HD50 that he didn't have the opportunity to serve longer. He will truly be missed.

Re: REQUEST APPOINTMENT OF TWO (2) MEMBERS TO THE COUNTY OPEN LANDS, TRAILS, AND PARKS ADVISORY COMMITTEE (COLTPAC) (GROWTH MANAGEMENT)

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

Appointments to the County Open Lands, Trails, and Parks advisory committee follow the procedure outlined in Resolution No. 2011-4. The purpose of the Committee is to advise the BCC, acting through and with the assistance of the County staff on matters related to open space, trails, and parks.

In accordance with Resolution 2011-4, COLTPAC members are appointed by the BCC based on letters of interest, qualifications, county-wide representation, and advice from staff. Members should be of diverse backgrounds and representative of the varied users of Santa Fe County open space, trails, and parks. Desirable expertise for COLTPAC membership includes experience on matters such as conservation, restoration, natural and cultural resources, community interests, education, trails planning and construction, hydrology, agriculture, wildlife, water, management and stewardship, public administration, and finance.

The Resolution identifies the COLTPAC as 9 members, one member appointed by each Commissioner from their district and the remaining members appointed as "At Large" who may reside in any area of the County. The Committee currently has representatives from four of the five Commission Districts, two "At Large" representatives from District 5 and one "At Large" representative from District 4.

COLTPAC has two (2) vacancies to fill; one (1) vacancy for District 3 and one (1) "At Large" vacancy. The District 3 position is currently vacant and the "At Large" vacancy became vacant through resignation. The terms for these vacancies expire in January of 2014. Staff advertised the COLTPAC vacancies in the local newspaper, placed on the County website and through a press release from the Public Information Officer in addition to email notification.

Staff received four (4) volunteer applications to be considered by the Board for an appointment to serve on COLTPAC. Their letters of interest and resumes are attached as exhibits to this document.

ACTION REQUESTED:

Staff recommends that the Commission appoint a representative from District 3 and an "At Large" appointment to complete the existing terms which are set to expire in January 2014.

Staff recommends that the Board select William Baker as the District 3 Representative and select Almudena Ortiz Cuè as the "At-Large" representative. Staff further recommends that the representatives selected for COLTPAC be appointed for the existing term and to serve the subsequent 3 year term beginning in January 2014.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) seeks to advance efforts county-wide to acquire, protect, manage, and restore open lands and important cultural and historical landscapes, and to promote construction and maintenance of trails and parks for the benefit and use of County residents and visitors, and to build awareness of the importance of land conservation and restoration, through education and land stewardship, and

WHEREAS, the County Open Land and Trails Planning Advisory Committee (COLTPAC) was first established in 1998 to assist in implementing the County's Wildlife, Trails, and Historic Places Program, and

WHEREAS, since that time the Program has matured and is now the Open Space and Trails Program and functions within the Community Services Department and the goals of the committee have changed, and

WHEREAS, the BCC desires to establish a Committee to accomplish these goals,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HEREBY RESCINDS RESOLUTIONS NO. 1998-105, 1998-132, 2000-14, 2001-01, and 2001-46, AND PROCLAIMS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The BCC hereby establishes the County Open Lands, Trails, and Parks Advisory Committee, "COLTPAC" (the Committee).
2. The purpose of the Committee is to advise the BCC, acting through and with the assistance of the Open Space and Trails Program staff, on matters related to open space, trails, and parks.
3. The duties and responsibilities of the Committee are:
 - a. to evaluate applications by property owners and to recommend to the BCC property to be acquired for open space, trails, and parks;
 - b. to advise on the funding for the Open Space and Trails Program;
 - c. to assist in updating and reviewing the Open Space and Trails Plan, adopted by Resolution No. 2000-60, as necessary;
 - d. to examine and make changes to the criteria for property selection when necessary;
 - e. to establish volunteer subcommittees to address specific concerns for open space and trails and parks, and;
 - f. to work with County staff to provide public outreach.

4. Members of the Committee shall be appointed by the BCC based on letters of interest, qualifications, county-wide representation, and advice from Open Space and Trails Program staff. Members should be of diverse backgrounds, representative of the varied users of Santa Fe County open space, trails, and parks. Desirable expertise among the membership of the Committee includes experience on matters such as conservation, restoration, natural and cultural resources, community interests, education, trails planning and construction, hydrology, agriculture, wildlife, water, management and stewardship, public administration, and finance.
5. The Committee shall be made up of nine (9) members appointed by the BCC. Of the initial appointments, five (5) shall serve for a two-year term, and four (4) shall serve for a three-year term. Subsequent terms shall be for three years. Members shall serve for no more than two (2) consecutive terms, including those members who compose the existing committee and whose terms expire on December 31, 2010. Those existing members whose terms expire on December 31, 2010 and who have only served for one term are eligible to serve one more term of two (2) years. The chairperson shall serve for a two-year term and shall be selected by majority vote of the members of the Committee. The BCC shall make an appointment to fill any vacancy of an unexpired term. Members may be removed by the BCC with or without cause.
6. All Committee members shall reside within Santa Fe County. One member shall be appointed by each Commissioner from residents of their Commission District; the remaining members shall be at-large and may reside in any area of the County and be nominated by any Commissioner. Notwithstanding the geographic distribution of the members, all members shall be charged with representing the best interests of the County as a whole.
7. The Committee shall meet as often as necessary to carry out its work, but not less than quarterly. The meetings of the Committee shall be held in the Commission Chambers and such other locations as may be conducive to visible and publicly accessible meetings. Meetings shall be held in accordance with the then current Open Meetings Act Resolution of the Board of County Commissioners of Santa Fe County, as well as the then current Resolution Establishing Rules of Order for Meetings of the Board of County Commissioners of Santa Fe County and for Certain Specified Committees.
8. The County should allocate a sufficient budget to ensure advertising in accordance with the County's Open Meetings Act Resolution. However, the terms of this Resolution are contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorizations being made. If sufficient appropriations and authorizations are not made or given by the County, the Committee shall cease operation until such time as funding allows for compliance with publication and noticing requirements.
9. All matters coming before the Committee shall be resolved by majority vote of the quorum.
10. The County Manager shall appoint a member of the County Open Space and Trails Program staff to serve as liaison to the Committee. The liaison shall be responsible for stenographic services during meetings. The liaison shall ensure that packets are prepared

for Committee members prior to each meeting, and that notices and agendas are created and posted in accordance with the County's Open Meetings Act Resolution.





Robert,

I would like to be considered for a position on COLTPAC representing Commission District 3. I have discussed the position with Sam Palin and I have been encouraged by Mike Madden and Robert Holden from EMRTC to apply. I live in San Pedro and I have worked with both Santa Fe County and BLM on open space and trail issues in my part of the county. I was the San Pedro representative who regularly participated with the county staff in the development of the Sustainable Growth Management Plan and I was one of a dozen people that served on the Open Space and Trails Focus Group in direct support of the development of that section of the plan.

I moved to New Mexico in 1969 and then worked for 4 years as an Air Force Officer at Kirtland AFB. I have a PhD in Physics from The Ohio State University. After my military duty commitment was completed, I was hired as a civilian scientist by the Air Force Research Laboratory on Kirtland AFB and worked there on a multitude of diverse National Defense Programs until my retirement as a Senior Executive in 2010. While living in Albuquerque I made frequent use of the Albuquerque Open Space and National Forest Trails for hiking and bicycling. I moved to San Pedro in Santa Fe County in 1998. I found that the only place to bicycle was on the State Highways and I felt that was too dangerous. I have neighbors who take their bicycles to Albuquerque every Sunday where they can safely ride on the open space trails. I would like to see similar opportunities in the southern part of Santa Fe County. I found that although there is a lot of public land in my part of the county on which to hike, there is very little legal access. I am not a horse person, but many of my neighbors have horses and I am very familiar with their desires. People in my community often hike and ride across private property without receiving permission. I still go to Albuquerque to hike in its open spaces. I would like to see better legal access for horse riders, bikers and hikers in District 3, particularly in the southern part of this very large district.

I do not have direct experience in the working with the planning and management of open space and trails, but I believe that the skills that I gained and used as a Federal Employee for 40 years are directly applicable to the to the challenges and needs of COLTPAC. Deciding on acquisition projects, performing planning and management and implementing plans is what I did for national security projects. I am very excited about the possibility of applying to my expertise and time to open lands and trails in Santa Fe County. I served on the Board of Directors of the San Pedro Neighborhood Association for many years and participated in a number of county and BLM planning activities. I left the BOD in September of 2012. Since I am retired from Federal Civilian Service and working only part time as an Independent Consultant for three New Mexico defense contractors, I have the time to support COLTPAC activities. 


