RE: Election Precincts and Polling Places

ISSUE:

On the agenda for your consideration are two items related to Election Precincts and Polling Places: (1) A resolution designating the polling place of each precinct within Santa Fe County (County) and creating two new precincts and (2) a map establishing the boundaries of the two new precincts and the precincts out of which they were created.

BACKGROUND:

Agenda Item III(F)(1) is a resolution that is necessary to comply with State law. Specifically, by the first Monday in November of each odd-numbered year, Section 1-3-2 NMSA 1978 requires that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) designate the polling place of each precinct in Santa Fe County, New Mexico. In addition, the Board must (i) designate the polling place of each precinct in the County and (ii) create additional precincts to meet the requirements of Section 1-3-1 NMSA 1978 or upon petition pursuant to Section 4-38-21 NMSA 1978

Exhibit A attached to the proposed resolution designates the precincts and polling places of each precinct in Santa Fe County.

Section 1-3-1(B) NMSA 1978 requires that “[a] precinct for general or primary election purposes shall not have had more than eight hundred votes cast in-person in that precinct at the last preceding general election.” During the 2014 general election, 832 in-person votes were cast in Precinct 82. Creating a new precinct to reduce the number of voters in Precinct 82 is both required by law and in the interest of the convenience of the voters of Santa Fe County.

Exhibit B attached to the proposed resolution designates and describes the boundaries of the two precincts created from the current Precinct 82 – a smaller Precinct 82 and a new Precinct 90. The new boundaries were created to make the

new precincts approximately equal in area and number of voters, and with the convenience of all voters in mind.

The Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Governor and Council have requested that proposed new Precinct 91 be created. Exhibit C attached to the proposed resolution is a letter from Pojoaque Pueblo Governor Talachy and Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Council Resolution 2015-165.

Exhibit D attached to the proposed resolution designates and describes the boundaries of the precinct created from the current Precinct 23, Precinct 59, Precinct 60, Precinct 61 to create the new Precinct 91. The boundaries of the proposed new precinct largely coincide with the boundaries of the Pojoaque Pueblo. The new Precinct 91 complies with the substantive standards governing the creation and size of precincts.

We estimate that each new precinct will cost approximately \$1,000 per election for supplies and the salaries of the precinct boards. It is estimated that these costs can be absorbed in the County Clerk's existing election budget.

Agenda Item III(F)(2) is the map of the boundaries of new Precincts 90 and 91 and the revised boundaries of the precincts out of which those precincts were created. Such a map must be submitted to the Secretary of State along with the resolution adjusting precinct boundaries and creating the new precincts.

REQUEST ACTION:

Santa Fe County Clerk Geraldine Salazar respectfully requests that the Board of County Commissioners support these agenda items and approve the resolution and map.

DESIGNATING THE POLLING PLACE OF EACH PRECINCT IN SANTA FE
COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, CREATING A NEW AND SEPARATE PRECINCT 90
AND CHANGING THE BOUNDARIES OF EXISTING PRECINCT 82, AND
CREATING A NEW PRECINCT 91 AND CHANGING THE BOUNDARIES OF
EXISTING PRECINCTS 23, 59, 60 AND 61

WHEREAS, Section 1-3-2 NMSA 1978 requires that, by no later than the first Monday in November of each odd-numbered year, the Board of County Commissioners (Board) of Santa Fe County (County) must (i) designate the polling place of each precinct in the County and (ii) create additional precincts to meet the requirements of Section 1-3-1 NMSA 1978 or upon petition pursuant to Section 4-38-21 NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the attached Exhibit A designates the precincts and polling places of each precinct in the County, including the two new precincts created herein; and

WHEREAS, each polling place included in the attached Exhibit A is accessible to individuals with physical mobility limitations; and

WHEREAS, Section 1-3-1(B) NMSA 1978 requires that “[a] precinct for general or primary election purposes shall not have had more than eight hundred votes cast in person in that precinct at the last preceding general election”; and

WHEREAS, during the 2014 general election, 832 in person votes were cast in Precinct 82; and

WHEREAS, creating a new precinct to reduce the number of voters in Precinct 82 is both required by law and in the interest of the convenience of County voters; and

WHEREAS, the attached Exhibit B designates and describes the boundaries of the two precincts created from existing Precinct 82 – a smaller Precinct 82 and a new Precinct 90; and

WHEREAS, the smaller Precinct 82 and new Precinct 90 are composed of contiguous and compact areas having clearly definable boundaries that comply with the provisions of the Precinct Boundary Adjustment Act, as required by Section 1-3-1(A) NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the Pueblo of Pojoaque, through its Tribal Governor and Council, requested that a new Precinct 91 be created out of existing Precincts 23, 59, 60, and 61; and

WHEREAS, attached as Exhibit C are the formal request letter from the Governor of the Pueblo of Pojoaque and Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Council Resolution 2015-165; and

WHEREAS, the attached Exhibit D designates and describes the modified boundaries of Precincts 23, 59, 60, and 61 and the boundaries of the new Precinct 91; and

WHEREAS, the Board finds that the new Precinct 91 is composed of contiguous and compact areas having clearly definable boundaries that comply with the provisions of the Precinct Boundary Adjustment Act, as required by Section 1-3-1(A) NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, the Board further finds that the new Precinct 91 covers as small an area as practicable and serves the greatest convenience of the voters therein in that, among other reasons, most voters in new Precinct 91 will have a shorter distance to travel to their designated polling place.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board as follows:

1. The polling place for each precinct in the County is hereby designated as set forth in attached Exhibit A.
2. A new Precinct 90 is hereby created out of existing Precinct 82. The new boundaries of Precinct 82 and boundaries of new Precinct 90 are hereby established as set forth in Exhibit B.
3. A new Precinct 91 is hereby created out of existing Precincts 23, 59, 60, and 61. The new boundaries of Precincts 23, 59, 60, and 61 and boundaries of new Precinct 91 are hereby established as set forth in Exhibit D.



New Precinct (Split from Precinct 82) Beginning at Camino La Tierra and Fin del Sendero; thence north to Lluvia de Oro and then to Paseo de Aquila; thence north to Camino Ladera; thence west on Alamo Creek; thence north on Paseo La Tierra until it becomes Calle Adelina; thence to Vuelta Maria; thence to first unnamed stream; thence northeast on second unnamed stream; thence to Tesuque Pueblo boundary line; thence north to northwest corner of Tesuque Pueblo boundary; thence east to Arroyo Ancho; thence north to first dirt track; thence south to second dirt track; thence west to third unnamed stream; thence west to Buckman Road; thence northwest on Buckman Road; thence to power line; thence west on power line; thence south on Rio Grande to fourth unnamed stream and west to Santa Fe County boundary line; thence south on Santa Fe County boundary line to power lines; thence southeast on power lines to Forest Service Road 24; thence southeast on Forest Service Road 24 to County Road 62/Caja de Oro Grant Road West; thence north on Caja Del Rio Road to Las Campanas Road; thence east on Camino La Tierra and back to the beginning.

Precinct 82 (Adjusted Boundary) Beginning at NM 599 and Camino La Tierra; thence northwest on Camino La Tierra to Las Campanas Dr; thence southwest to Caja Del Rio Road; thence south to N. Caja Del Rio Grant Road; thence southeast to NM 599; thence northeast and back to the beginning.

PUEBLO OF POJOAQUE TRIBAL COUNCIL RESOLUTION 2015 - 165

AUTHORIZING GOVERNOR TALACHY TO SUBMIT LETTER ON BEHALF OF THE PUEBLO REQUESTING CREATION OF A PRECINCT FOR THE PUEBLO OF POJOAQUE WITHIN SANTA FE COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Pueblo of Pojoaque ("Pueblo") is a federally recognized, sovereign Indian tribe;

WHEREAS, the Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Council ("Council") is the governing body of the Pueblo vested with all the power, authority, and responsibility for the health, safety and welfare of all tribal members and the community; for the exercise of all governmental functions of the Pueblo; and for the overall direction and policy of the Pueblo;

WHEREAS, the Pueblo is located within the United States of America, State of New Mexico, and wholly in Santa Fe County;

WHEREAS, the Pueblo's Indian lands are located within the exterior boundaries of Santa Fe County; 3rd U.S. Congressional District; 6th New Mexico Senate District; 46th New Mexico House of Representatives District; District 1 of Santa Fe County Commission; New Mexico Public Regulation District 3; New Mexico Board of Education District 10; and Pojoaque Valley School District;

WHEREAS, the Pueblo's lands are currently divided between four Santa Fe County precincts, numbered 23, 59, 60, and 61;

WHEREAS, the Pueblo of Pojoaque as a sovereign, federally recognized tribe, through its Pueblo Governor and Tribal Council have the authority to request that the Santa Fe Board of County Commissioners and the Santa Fe County Clerk, on behalf of the Pueblo, establish a precinct pursuant to Chapter 1 (Elections), Article 3 (Precincts and Polling Places) of the New Mexico Statutes, specifically NMSA §§ 1-3-1; 1-3-2; 1-3-5; 1-3-6; 1-3-7; 1-3-7.1; 1-3-8; 1-3-10; 1-3-12; 1-3-13; and 1-3-14;

WHEREAS, the Council finds that it is important to create a new voting precinct for the Pueblo of Pojoaque in order to promote voter participation and education among tribal members;

WHEREAS, the Council finds it necessary to establish a precinct that shall provide access, a voting venue, and a voting roster;

WHEREAS, Pueblo leaders and Council members have been working cooperatively with representatives from Santa Fe County and the Secretary of State's Office in an effort to establish the boundaries for a new voting precinct;

WHEREAS, the efforts to establish new precinct boundaries have focused on the goals of trying to encompass as much tribal land and as many tribal members within the new precinct as possible, while also adhering to state laws and regulations governing the creation of precinct boundaries; and


WHEREAS, the Council wishes to initiate a joint effort with the Santa Fe County Board of Commissioners, Santa Fe County Clerk, and Santa Fe County Clerk staff to create a new precinct under the New Mexico Election Codes and Statutes.


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Council authorizes Governor Joseph Talachy to submit a letter to the Santa Fe County Board of Commissioners Chairman in order to initiate a joint effort with the Santa Fe Board of County Commissioners and the Santa Fe County Clerk to create a new precinct under the New Mexico Election Codes and Statutes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Council gives authority to Governor Talachy to approve such an agreement with Santa Fe County.

CERTIFICATION

The foregoing Resolution was adopted by the Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Council, at a duly called meeting at which a quorum was present and voting throughout, on October 8, 2015, by the vote of 36 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining.


The Pueblo of Pojoaque has demonstrated our good faith in citizenship in Santa Fe County in the state of New Mexico, through our participation in various elections. Recently, Pojoaque Pueblo has noticed a desire of our voting age citizens to participate in school, county, state, and federal elections.

For years Pojoaque Pueblo has had a obligation to have its own precinct, encumbering our historical pueblo lands. On August 11, 2015 we had a meeting with the Native American Election Information Program from the Secretary of State's Office and were given the assistance in reviewing the election statutes to request a precinct, upon the assistance we initiated a request for a creation of a precinct for the Pueblo. Upon request, James Rivera, tribal member was given the authority to proceed with precinct development. The time has arrived for Pojoaque Pueblo to take the opportunity to request for a precinct in Santa Fe County. This letter serves as a formal request from Pojoaque Pueblo to have and establish a precinct and polling place composed of lands of the pueblo. Such a precinct opens the opportunity for provisions of minority language assistance, voter education, voter registration and participation.

The enclosed adopted Pueblo of Pojoaque Tribal Resolution commits our desire to establish a precinct for Pojoaque Pueblo. The pueblo is more than willing to work in conjunction with Santa Fe County Clerk Geraldine Salazar and her election division staff in creating this new precinct. It is with the above elements and other resources to come, the Pueblo of Pojoaque request the Santa Fe County Clerk in her official capacity and the Santa Fe Board of Commissioners in their official capacity to approve a precinct for Pojoaque Pueblo. The attached Tribal Resolution is our assurance and obligation.

PRECINCT 23 - Beginning at NM 503 and Sarma Rd. ; thence east on NM 503; thence west on Tsay Shu Pin Bugeh/Tony Alfred Perez Road (aka Apricot Road); thence following Acequia La Nueva until its terminus at State Road 503; thence north on NM 503 to Census Block boundary line before Juan Medina Road/County Road 98/NM 520 (the census line does not connect with Juan Medina Rd); thence west at Arroyo Seco Stream and continue west on stream until US 84/285; thence south on to the northern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence east to the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence south on the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence southwest following an unnamed arroyo to Sarma Rd.; then back to the beginning.

PRECINCT 59 - Beginning at US 84/285 and NM 502; thence north on US 84/285 to NM 503; thence east to Old Pueblito Rd.; thence east to El Callejoncito; thence north to Trujillo Rd.; thence east on unnamed road; thence north on Old Callejon Rd.; thence west on NM 503; thence northwest on Shining Sun Rd.; thence north to the Santa Fe County and Rio Arriba County boundary lines; thence south on Santa Fe County boundary line and then west; thence south on eastern boundary of San Ildefonso Pueblo to NM 502; thence east on NM 502 and back to the beginning.



PRECINCT 60 - Beginning at US 84/285 and NM 502; thence west on NM 502 to Rio Grande, following the Rio Grande south to power lines which begin before the Santa Fe County and Los Alamos County boundary lines; thence east on power lines for about .5 mile to Camino La Tierra/Old Buckman Road/ County Road 77; thence south to the third unnamed stream; thence east on unnamed stream to dirt track, which travels southeast then turns northeast and runs beside the northwest boundary of Tesuque Pueblo; thence south on Arroyo Ancho back to the northern Tesuque Pueblo boundary line; thence east on boundary line to US 84/285; thence north to the southern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo,; thence west to the Arroyo Ancha; thence north following the Arroyo Ancha to unnamed service road; thence east to unnamed arroyo; thence north following unnamed arroyo to US 84/285; thence west to Viarrial Rd.; thence north to Cities of Gold Rd.; thence southeast to Tribal Works Rd.; thence north on unnamed road to Lightning Rd.; thence northwest to Camino del Rincon; thence following Camino del Rincon west and then south to off ramp to US 84/285; thence south on US 84/285 back to the beginning.

PRECINCT 61 - Beginning at US 84/285 and Arroyo Cuyamungue Road, which travels southeast and then turns back northeast; thence east on Nambe Pueblo Boundary Line; following Nambe Pueblo boundary line as it turns south; thence east and finally north; thence west on the Rio Nambe continuing to the Nambe Falls Lake; thence following the southern lake shore to the Nambe Falls Dam; thence northwest on the Rio Nambe to County Road 84F/Aveh Poe; thence northeast on County Road 84 F to County Road 119 South/Ossaapuu Poe; thence northwest on County Road 119S to County Road 84 G/Povi Pin Poe; thence northeast on County Road 84G to Nambe Pueblo Road 101/Poechunu Poe; thence north on Nambe Pueblo Road 101 for approx. 190 ft. to Acequia La Nueva; thence northwest on Acequia La Nueva to Nambe Pueblo Road 101; thence northwest on Nambe Pueblo Road 101 for about 480 ft. to Acequia La Nueva;

thence west on Acequia La Nueva to State Road 503; thence west on NM 503 and Mesita Ranch Rd and Unnamed Arroyo; thence south to the Nambe River; thence east following the Nambe River to the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo boundary; thence south to the southern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence west to US 84/285 and back to beginning.

NEW PRECINCT 91 – Beginning at US 84/285 and Shining Sun Rd.; thence north to the northern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence east to the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence south on the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence southwest following an unnamed arroyo to Sarma Rd; thence southwest on Sarma Rd. to NM 503; thence west to NM 503 and Mesita Ranch Rd and Unnamed Arroyo; thence south to the Nambe River; thence east following the Nambe River to the eastern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo boundary; thence south to the southern boundary of the Pojoaque Pueblo; thence west to Arroyo Ancha; thence north following the Arroyo Ancha to unnamed service road; thence east to unnamed arroyo; thence north following unnamed arroyo to US 84/285; thence west to Viarrial Rd.; thence north to Cities of Gold Rd.; thence southeast to Tribal Works Rd.; thence north on unnamed road to Lightning Rd.; thence northwest to Camino del Rincon; thence following Camino del Rincon west and then south to off ramp to US 84/285; thence north to Old Pueblito Rd.; thence east to El Callejoncito; thence north to Trujillo Rd.; thence east on unnamed road; thence north on Old Callejon Rd.; thence west on NM 503; thence northwest on Shining Sun Rd. back to beginning.


