## II. CONTRACT OBJECTIVES

### A. PURPOSE OF THIS REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL

Santa Fe County (SFC) owns and operates the Steve Herrera First Judicial District Court Complex located at 100 Catron Street in Santa Fe New Mexico. SFC is requesting professional consulting services necessary to explore redevelopment options for the site following the relocation of the courts to the new facility in Santa Fe.

### B. SCOPE OF WORK

SFC is requesting consulting services necessary to provide recommendations to the County for redevelopment of an existing property that currently houses the Stephen Herrera First Judicial District Court Complex which originally served as a Junior High School. The project will study the property's existing conditions and options for redevelopment including schematic level ideas for structured parking, improved circulation, added area, new mechanical, electrical and data systems as well as preliminary cost projections associated with those improvements.

The work will also include professional study of current value, local real estate market conditions, redevelopment options for highest and best use, finance options, as well as projected short and long term return on investment.

The site is located on an approximately 2.35 acre parcel in downtown Santa Fe, NM and includes the existing court building and parking area. The building includes approximately 60,000 square feet of building area on two levels plus a basement. The site fronts on three streets and includes approximately 100,000 square feet of exterior parking, landscaping and sidewalk/driveway area.

The requested services will include, but are not limited to:

- Study of SFC's current and potential future space needs.
- Market analysis of area retail and office space supply and projected absorption rates.
- Determining existing site and building suitability and capacity for redevelopment and expansion, include information regarding sustainable development and LEED potential.
- Analysis of existing environmental, archeological and subsurface soil conditions.
- Review of local building codes and Historic Design Review requirements.
- Examining opportunities for joint use with other public and/or private entities.
- Providing preliminary space use and design options including Schematic level plans, sections and elevations.
- Provide preliminary projected development and construction costs.
- Provide an analysis of finance options including Public/Private funding opportunities.
- Provide an analysis of SFC's best use options including: full redevelopment, limited redevelopment or sale of property.
- Provide a Project Report and Recommendations to the SFC Board of County Commissioners on the best use of the property. Include statement on Economic, Social and Cultural impact on downtown Santa Fe for each option.

C. QUALIFICATIONS

SFC is seeking professional consulting services necessary to provide recommendations to the County for redevelopment options of an existing property. Qualifications may include but not limited to real estate and market analysis, architectural and engineering services, property development, cost estimating, financial analysis.

D. INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

The insurance required by Offeror are listed below.

- a. General Conditions. Contractor shall submit evidence of insurance as is required herein. Policies of insurance shall be written by companies authorized to write such insurance in New Mexico.
- b. General Liability Insurance, Including Automobile. Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement a comprehensive general liability and automobile insurance policy with liability limits in amounts not less than \$1,050,000 combined single limits of liability for bodily injury, including death, and property damage for any one occurrence. Said policies of insurance shall include coverage for all operations performed for County by Contractor; coverage for the use of all owned, non-owned, hired automobiles, vehicles and other equipment, both on and off work; and contractual liability coverage under which this Agreement is an insured contract. County of Santa Fe shall be a named additional insured on the policy.
- c. Workers' Compensation Insurance. Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act.
- d. Professional Liability Insurance. The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement a Professional Liability Insurance.
- e. Increased Limits. If, during the life of this Agreement, the Legislature of the State of New Mexico increases the maximum limits of liability under the Tort Claims Act (NMSA 1978, Sections 41-4-1 through 41-4-29, as amended), Contractor shall increase the maximum limits of any insurance required herein.

E. PROCUREMENT MANAGER

Any inquiries or requests regarding this procurement should be submitted to the Procurement Manager in writing. Offerors may contact ONLY the Procurement Manager regarding the procurement. Other County employees do not have the authority to respond on behalf of the County.

F. DEFINITION OF TERMINOLOGY

This section contains definitions and abbreviations that are used throughout this procurement document.

“BCC” means the elected Board of County Commissioners.

“Close of Business” means 5:00 PM Mountain Standard Time or Mountain Daylight Time, whichever is in effect on the date given.

“Contract” or “Agreement” means a written agreement for the procurement of items of tangible personal property or services.

“Contractor” means a successful offeror who enters into a binding contract.

“County” means Santa Fe County.

“Determination” means the written documentation of a decision by the Procurement Manager including findings of fact supporting a decision. A determination becomes part of the procurement file.

“Desirable” The terms “may”, “can”, “should”, “preferably”, or “prefers” identify a desirable or discretionary item or factor (as opposed to “mandatory”).

“Evaluation Committee” means a body appointed by the County management to perform the evaluation of offeror proposals.

“Finalist” is defined as an offeror who meets all the mandatory specifications of this Request for Proposals and whose score on evaluation factors is sufficiently high to merit further consideration by the Evaluation Committee.

“Mandatory” The terms “must”, “shall”, “will”, “is required”, or “are required”, identify a mandatory item or factor (as opposed to “desirable”). Failure to meet a mandatory item or factor will result in the rejection of the offeror’s proposal.

“Offeror” is any person, corporation, or partnership who chooses to submit a proposal.

“Procurement Manager” means the person or designee authorized by the County to manage or administer a procurement requiring the evaluation of competitive sealed proposals.

“Purchasing Division” means the Santa Fe County Purchasing Division, Administrative Services Department.

“Request for Proposals” or “RFP” means all documents, including those attached or incorporated by reference, used for soliciting proposals.

“Responsible Offeror” means an offeror who submits a responsive proposal and who has furnished, when required, information and data to prove that his financial resources, production or service facilities, personnel, service reputation and experience are adequate to make satisfactory delivery of the services or items of tangible personal property described in the proposal.

“Responsive Offer” or “Responsive Proposal” means an offer or proposal which conforms in all material respects to the requirements set forth in the request for proposals. Material respects of a request for proposals include, but are not limited to, price, quality, quantity or delivery requirements.

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### III. CONDITIONS GOVERNING THE PROCUREMENT

B. EXPLANATION OF EVENTS

The following paragraphs describe the activities listed in the sequence of events shown in Section III, Paragraph A.

1. Issue of RFP

This RFP is being issued by the Public Works Department and the Purchasing Division.

2. Pre-Proposal Conference, if applicable

A Pre-Proposal Conference is scheduled for on the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. Questions may be submitted at the Pre-Proposal Conference and after up until the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. A public log will be kept of the names of potential offerors that attended the pre-proposal conference.

3. Acknowledgement of Receipt Form Due

A potential Offeror should hand-deliver, return by facsimile or e-mail the "Acknowledgement of Receipt Form" provided as Appendix A to have its name and firm placed on the procurement distribution list. The form should be signed by an authorized representative of the organization, dated and returned by close of business on the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A.

The procurement distribution list will be used for the distribution of written responses to questions and any RFP addendums.

4. Deadline to Submit Additional Written Questions

Potential Offerors may submit written questions regarding this RFP until the close of business on the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. All written questions must be addressed to the Procurement Manager, listed in Section II, Paragraph E. and sent via facsimile or e-mail. **Any contact with any other County staff member other than the Procurement Manager named in this solicitation will be grounds for rejection of a proposal.**

5. Response to Written Questions

Written responses to written questions and any RFP addenda will be distributed on the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A, to all potential Offerors whose names appear on the procurement distribution list.

Additional written requests for clarification of distributed answers or addenda must be received by the Procurement Manager no later than one (1) day after the answers or addenda were issued.

6. Submission of Proposal

**ALL OFFEROR PROPOSALS MUST BE RECEIVED FOR REVIEW AND EVALUATION BY THE PROCUREMENT MANAGER OR DESIGNEE NO LATER THAN 2:00 P.M. (MOUNTAIN (STANDARD TIME) ON DECEMBER 28, 2012.** Proposals received after this deadline will not be accepted. The date and time of receipt will be recorded on each proposal. Proposals must be addressed and delivered to the Procurement Manager at the address listed in Section II, D. Proposals must be sealed and labeled on the outside of the package to clearly indicate that they are in response to the County's Request for Proposals 2013-0198-PW/BT and refer to the RFP number. Proposals submitted by facsimile or other electronic means will not be accepted.

A public log will be kept of the names of all offeror organizations that submitted proposals. Pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 13-1-116, the contents of any proposal shall not be disclosed to competing offerors prior to contract award.

7. Proposal Evaluation

The evaluation of proposals will be performed by an Evaluation Committee appointed by the Procurement Manager. This process will take place during the timeframe indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at III.A. During this time, the Procurement Manager may initiate discussions with Offerors who submit responsive or potentially responsive proposals for the purpose of clarifying aspects of the proposals, but proposals may be accepted and evaluated without such discussion. Discussions SHALL NOT be initiated by the Offerors.

8. Selection of Finalists (If Applicable)

The Evaluation Committee may select and the Procurement Manager may notify the Finalist Offerors on the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. Only Finalists will be invited to participate in the subsequent steps of the procurement if the Finalist process is used.

10. Oral Presentation by Finalists (If Applicable)

Finalist Offerors may be required to present their proposals to the Evaluation Committee. The Procurement Manager will schedule the time for each Offeror presentation. All Offeror presentations will be held at the Santa Fe County Purchasing Division, 142 W. Palace Avenue (Second Floor), Santa Fe, New Mexico. Each presentation will be limited to one (1) hour in duration.

10. Fee Negotiations (If Applicable)

Finalist Offerors may be asked to submit their cost proposals for the purpose of negotiations by the date indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A.

11. Finalize Contract

The contract will be finalized with the most advantageous Offeror during the timeframe indicated in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. In the event that mutually agreeable terms cannot be reached within the time specified, the County reserves the right to finalize a contract with the next most advantageous Offeror without undertaking a new procurement process.

12. Contract Award

The County anticipates awarding the contract on the date in the "Sequence of Events" at Section III.A. These dates are subject to change at the discretion of the Santa Fe County Purchasing Manager.

The contract shall be awarded to the Offeror or Offerors whose proposal is most advantageous to the County, taking into consideration the evaluation factors set forth in the RFP. The most advantageous proposal may or may not have received the most points.

13. Right to Protest

Any protest by an Offeror must be timely and in conformance with NMSA 1978, Section 13-1-172 and applicable procurement regulations. Protests must be written and must include the name and address of the protestor and the request for proposals number. It must also contain a statement of grounds for protest including appropriate supporting exhibits. The protests must be delivered to the Santa Fe County Purchasing Division:

Protests will not be accepted by facsimile or other electronic means. Protests received after the deadline will not be accepted.

### C. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

This procurement will be conducted in accordance with Chapter 13, NMSA 1978, NMAC 1.4.1 and the Santa Fe County Procurement Regulations.

#### 1. Acceptance of Conditions Governing the Procurement

Offerors must indicate their acceptance of the Conditions Governing the Procurement section in the letter of transmittal. Submission of a proposal constitutes acceptance of the contract template attached hereto as Appendix A.

#### 2. Incurring Cost

Any cost incurred by the offeror in preparation, transmittal, presentation of any proposal or material submitted in response to this RFP shall be borne solely by the offeror.

#### 3. Prime Contractor Responsibility

Any contract that may result from this RFP shall specify that the prime contractor is solely responsible for fulfillment of the contract with the County. The County will make contract payments to only the prime contractor.

#### 4. Subcontractors

Use of subcontractors must be clearly explained in the proposal, and major subcontractors must be identified by name. The prime contractor shall be wholly responsible for the entire performance whether or not subcontractors are used.

#### 5. Amended Proposals

An offeror may submit an amended proposal before the deadline for receipt of proposals. Such amended proposals must be complete replacements for a previously submitted proposal and must be clearly identified as such in the transmittal letter. County personnel will not merge, collate, or assemble proposal materials.

#### 6. Offerors' Rights to Withdraw Proposal

Offerors will be allowed to withdraw their proposals at any time prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals. The offeror must submit a written withdrawal request signed by the offeror's duly authorized representative addressed to the Procurement Manager. The approval or denial of withdrawal requests received

after the deadline for receipt of the proposals is governed by the applicable procurement regulations.

7. Proposal Offer Firm

Responses to this RFP, including proposal prices, will be considered firm for ninety (90) days after the due date for receipt of proposals or ninety (90) days after receipt of a best and final offer if one is submitted.

8. Disclosure of Proposal Contents

The proposals will be kept confidential until a contract is awarded. At that time, all proposals and documents pertaining to the proposals will be open to the public, except for the material that is proprietary or confidential. The Procurement Manager will not disclose or make public any pages of a proposal on which the offeror has stamped or imprinted "proprietary" or "confidential" subject to the following requirements.

Proprietary or confidential data shall be readily separable from the proposal in order to facilitate eventual public inspection of the non-confidential portion of the proposal. Confidential data is normally restricted to confidential financial information concerning the offeror's organization and data that qualifies as a trade secret in accordance with the Uniform Trade Secrets Act, 57-3A-1 to 57-3A-7, NMSA 1978. The price of products offered or the cost of services proposed shall not be designated as proprietary or confidential information.

If a request is received for disclosure of data for which an offeror has made a written request for confidentiality, the Santa Fe County Procurement Manger shall examine the offeror's request and make a written determination that specifies which portions of the proposal should be disclosed. Unless the offeror takes legal action to prevent the disclosure, the proposal will be so disclosed. The proposal shall be open to public inspection subject to any continuing prohibition on the disclosure of confidential data.

9. No Obligation

This procurement in no manner obligates Santa Fe County or any of its departments to the use of any proposed professional services until a valid written contract is awarded and approved by the appropriate authorities.

10. Termination

This RFP may be canceled at any time and any and all proposals may be rejected in whole or in part when the County determines such action to be in the best interest of the County

11. Sufficient Appropriation

Any contract awarded as a result of this RFP process may be terminated if sufficient appropriations or authorizations do not exist. Such termination will be effected by sending written notice to the contractor. The County's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations and authorizations are available will be accepted by the contractor as final.

12. Legal Review

The County requires that all offerors agree to be bound by the General Requirements contained in this RFP. Any offeror concerns must be promptly brought to the attention of the Procurement Manager.

13. Governing Law

This procurement and any agreement with offerors that may result shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Mexico.

14. Basis for Proposal

Only information supplied by the County in writing through the Procurement Manager or in this RFP should be used as the basis for the preparation of offeror proposals.

15. Contract Terms and Conditions

The contract between the County and the Contractor will follow the format specified by the County and contain the terms and conditions set forth in Appendix A. However, the County reserves the right to negotiate with a successful offeror provisions in addition to those contained in this RFP.

16. Offeror Qualifications

The Evaluation Committee may make such investigations as necessary to determine the ability of the offeror to adhere to the requirements specified within this RFP. The Evaluation Committee will reject the proposal of any offeror who is not a responsible offeror or fails to submit a responsive offer as defined in Sections 13-1-83 and 13-1-85 NMSA, 1978, subject to Procurement Manager approval.

17. Right to Waive Minor Irregularities

The Evaluation Committee reserves the right to waive minor irregularities. The Evaluation Committee also reserves the right to waive mandatory requirements provided that all of the otherwise responsive proposals failed to meet the mandatory requirements and/or doing so does not otherwise materially affect the procurement.

This right is at the sole discretion of the Evaluation Committee, subject to Procurement Manager approval.

18. Change in Contractor Representatives

The County reserves the right to require a change in contractor representatives if the assigned representatives are not, in the opinion of the County, meeting its needs adequately. Any change in contractor representative must receive prior County approval.

19. Notice

The Procurement Code, Sections 13-1-28 through 13-1-199, NMSA 1978, imposes civil and misdemeanor criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities and kick-backs.

20. County Rights

The County reserves the right to accept all or a portion of an offeror's proposal.

21. Right to Publish

Throughout the duration of this procurement process and contract term, potential offerors and contractors must secure from the County written approval prior to the release of any information that pertains to the potential work or activities covered by this procurement or the subsequent contract. Failure to adhere to this requirement may result in disqualification of the offeror's proposal or termination of the contract.

22. Ownership of Proposals

All documents submitted in response to this Request for Proposals shall become the property of the County. However, any technical or user documentation submitted with the proposals of non-selected offerors shall be returned after the expiration of the protest period.

23. Electronic Mail Address Recommended

A large part of the communication regarding this procurement will be conducted by electronic mail (e-mail). It is recommended that Offeror should have a valid e-mail address to receive this correspondence.

24. Preferences in Procurement by Santa Fe CountyA. *New Mexico In-state Preference.*

To receive a resident business preference pursuant to Section 13-1-21 NMSA 1978 or a resident contractor preference pursuant to Section 13-40-2 NMSA 1978, a business or contractor shall submit with its bid or proposal a copy of a valid resident business certificate or valid resident contractor certificate issued by the NM Department of Taxation and Revenue.

If an Offeror or Bidder submits with its proposal or bid a copy of a valid and current in-state resident business/contractor certificate, 5% of the total weight of all evaluation factors used in the evaluation of proposals may be awarded or added to the Offerors score and in the event of a Bidder, the bid will be 5% lower than the bid actually submitted.

Certification by the NM Department of Taxation and Revenue for the resident business or resident contractor takes into consideration such activities as the business or contractor's payment of property taxes or rent in the state.

**OR**

B. *New Mexico Resident Veteran Preference.*

New Mexico law, Section 13-1-22 NMSA 1978, provides a preference in the award of a public works contract for a “**resident veteran business**”. Certification by the department of taxation and revenue for the resident veteran business requires the Offeror to provide evidence of annual revenue and other evidence of veteran status.

An Offeror or Bidder who wants the veteran business preference to be applied to its proposal is required to submit with its proposal the certification from the department of taxation and revenue and the sworn affidavit attached hereto as Appendix \_\_\_.

If an Offeror or Bidder submits with its proposal a copy of a valid and current veteran resident business certificate, 10%, 8% or 7% of the total weight of all the evaluation factors used in the evaluation of proposals may be awarded or added to the Offerors score, depending on the business' annual revenue or 10%, 8% or 7% of the bid will be lower than the bid actually submitted.

**The resident business preference is not cumulative with the resident veteran business preference.**

**C. *Santa Fe County Preference***

Santa Fe County Ordinance 2012-4 provides for a **County preference** for a “Santa Fe County business.” Application of the County preference in procurement requires an Offeror to obtain and provide a Santa Fe County Business Certificate issued by the Santa Fe County Procurement Manager. Certification by the Procurement Manager takes into consideration the business’ corporate standing in the state, business licensure or registration, the duration of the business’ primary office location and the payment of taxes.

If an Offeror submits with its proposal a copy of its Santa Fe County Business Certificate issued by the Purchasing Manager, 5% of the total weight of all the evaluation factors used in the evaluation of proposals may be awarded to the Offerors score.

The in-state, veteran or County preferences do not apply to procurement of services or goods involving federal funds or federal grant funds.

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#### **IV. RESPONSE FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION**

A. NUMBER OF RESPONSES

Offerors shall submit only one proposal in response to this RFP.

B. NUMBER OF COPIES

Offerors shall deliver one (1) original and six (6) identical copies of their proposal to the location specified in Section II, Paragraph E on or before the closing date and time for receipt of proposals.

C. PROPOSAL FORMAT

All proposals shall be limited to twenty (20) pages, with exception to professional licenses and certifications, which shall be added as appendices. The document shall be typewritten on standard 8 1/2 x 11 paper, with a font no smaller than 12 pt. pitch, with nominal 1” margins and normal line spacing. Proposals shall be placed within a binder with tabs delineating each section.

1. Proposal Organization

Any proposal that does not adhere to these requirements may be deemed non-responsive and rejected on that basis.

The proposal summary may be included by offerors to provide the Evaluation Committee with an overview of the technical and business features of the proposal; however, this material will not be used in the evaluation process unless specifically referenced from other portions of the offeror's proposal.

Offerors may attach other materials that they feel may improve the quality of their responses. However, these materials should be included as items in a separate appendix.

2. Letter of Transmittal

Each proposal must be accompanied by a letter of transmittal. The letter of transmittal MUST:

- a) Identify the submitting organization;
- b) Identify the name and title of the person authorized by the organization to contractually obligate the organization;
- c) Identify the name, title and telephone number of the person authorized to negotiate the contract on behalf of the organization;
- d) Identify the names, titles and telephone numbers of persons to be contacted for clarification;
- e) Explicitly indicate Acceptance of the Conditions Governing the Procurement stated in Section III, Paragraph C.1;
- f) Be signed by the person authorized to contractually obligate the organization;

## V. SPECIFICATIONS

Offerors should respond in the form of a thorough narrative to each mandatory specification. The narratives along with required supporting materials will be evaluated and awarded points accordingly.

### A. INFORMATION

#### Time Frame

The contract is scheduled to begin in or around February 28, 2013. Santa Fe County intends on awarding a contract with a term of one (1) year with one (1) renewal period, not to exceed two years. (OR a contract with a term of one (1) year with three (3) renewal periods, not to exceed four years).

### B. EVALUATION CRITERIA

A brief explanation of each mandatory specification is listed below. Offerors are encouraged to fully address each category completely, as points are assigned for responses to each.

1. Specialized Experience and Technical Competence - Provide information about the firm's specific technical experience with similar projects that demonstrate competence to successfully complete the project, including a joint venture or association, regarding the type of services required.
2. Evidence of Understanding of the Scope - Describe in detail how the anticipated scope of work for the project will be organized. Include information about the project site, project administration, and scheduling.
3. Capacity and Capability - Provide information about the business that demonstrates the ability to provide sufficient professional competence, including any consultants, their representatives, qualifications and locations, to perform the work, including any specialized services with the time limitations.
4. Past Record of Performance - Demonstrate through contracts and other agreements with government agencies or private industry with respect to such factors as control of costs, quality of work and ability to meet schedules. Provide a minimum of three (3) projects where the Offeror provided project representative services with project title, owner point of contact, and telephone number.
5. Proximity to or Familiarity with Site Location - Demonstrate the firm's familiarity with the area in which the project is located and describe any issues or problems that may arise that could affect the work.
6. New Mexico Produced Work - It is in the County's best interest to support in-state businesses. Indicate the volume of work to be produced in New Mexico by a New Mexico firm or firms. Identify any out-of-state consultant(s) or business relationships

that will be involved on the project and the extent of services to be provided by that firm or firms.

**VI. EVALUATION**

The amount of discussion to be applied to each listed topic is an individual choice of the Offeror, however, discussion should be detailed enough to inform and educate evaluators.

Proposals will be scored based upon a comparison of the information submitted by each Offeror against the evaluation criteria outlined below. **(SPECIFICALLY FOR ARCHITECTS & ENGINEERS, SUBJECT TO CHANGE FOR OTHER PROFESSIONAL SERVICES)**

- 1) Specialized design and technical competence of the business, including a joint venture or association, regarding the type of services required ..... **250 points**
  - 2) Evidence of understanding of scope of work, the site, existing conditions, and the purpose and goals of the Santa Fe County programs ... **250 points**
  - 3) Capacity and capability of the business to perform the work, including any specialized services, within the time limitations ..... **150 points**
  - 4) Past record of performance on contracts with government agencies and private industry with respect to such factors as control of costs, quality of work, and ability to meet schedules ..... **150 points**
  - 5) Proximity to or familiarity with the area in which the project is located. .... **100 points**
  - 6) The amount of work that will be produced by a New Mexico business within the State..... **50 points**
  - 7) The volume of work previously done by the entity requesting proposals which is not 75% complete with respect to basic professional project representative services ..... **50 points**

**Preferences**

If a proposal contains a Resident Business Certificate or Resident Veterans Business Certificate and/or Santa Fe County Business Certificate, the applicable preference will be applied.

1. Proposal contains a valid N.M. Resident Business Certificate .....**50 points**

2. Proposal contains a valid Resident Veteran Business Certificate ..... **70, 80 or 100 points**

**AND**

3. Proposal contains a valid Santa Fe County Business Certificate .....**50 points**

**B. EVALUATION PROCESS**

The evaluation process will follow the steps listed below:

1. All Offeror proposals will be reviewed for compliance with the mandatory specifications stated within the RFP. Proposals deemed non-responsive will be eliminated from further consideration.
2. The Procurement Manager may contact the Offeror for clarification of the response as specified in Section III, Paragraph B.7.
3. The Evaluation Committee may use other sources of information to perform the evaluation as specified in Section III, Paragraph C.18.
4. Responsive proposals will be evaluated on the factors in Section V that have been assigned a point value. The responsible Offerors with the highest scores will be selected as finalist Offerors based upon the proposals submitted. Points awarded from the oral presentations will be added to the previously assigned points to attain final scores. The responsible Offeror whose proposal is most advantageous to the County, taking into consideration the evaluation factors in Section VI, will be recommended for contract award as specified in Section III, Paragraph B.12. Please note, however, that a serious deficiency in the response to any one factor may be grounds for rejection regardless of overall score.

**THIS AGREEMENT** is made and entered into this \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2012 by and between Santa Fe County, a political subdivision of the State of New Mexico (hereinafter referred to as the “County”) and the \_\_\_\_\_, a corporation, with a principal address of \_\_\_\_\_, hereinafter referred to as the “Contractor.”

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with NMSA 1978, §13-1-112 and §13-1-117, the County issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) #2013-0198-PW/BT to which Contractor successfully responded; and

**WHEREAS**, the Contractor is amenable to and capable of providing the consulting services to Santa Fe County in a professional and timely manner.

**WHEREAS**, the County requires these services and the Contractor is willing to provide the services and both parties wish to enter into this Agreement.

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the premises and mutual obligations herein, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

**1. SCOPE OF SERVICES**

The Contractor shall provide consulting services necessary to provide recommendations to the County for redevelopment of an existing property that currently houses the Stephen Herrera First Judicial District Court Complex which originally served as a Junior High School. The project will study the property’s existing conditions and options for redevelopment including schematic level ideas for structured parking, improved circulation, added area, new mechanical, electrical and data systems as well as preliminary cost projections associated with those improvements.

The work will also include professional study of current value, local real estate market conditions, redevelopment options for highest and best use, finance options, as well as projected short and long term return on investment.

The site is located on an approximately 2.35 acre parcel in downtown Santa Fe, NM and includes the existing court building and parking area. The building includes approximately 60,000 square feet of building area on two levels plus a basement. The site fronts on three streets and includes approximately 100,000 square feet of exterior parking, landscaping and sidewalk/driveway area.

The requested services will include but are not limited to:

- Study of SFC's current and potential future space needs.
- Market analysis of area retail and office space supply and projected absorption rates.
- Determining existing site and building suitability and capacity for redevelopment and expansion, include information regarding sustainable development and LEED potential.
- Analysis of existing environmental, archeological and subsurface soil conditions.
- Review of local building codes and Historic Design Review requirements.
- Examining opportunities for joint use with other public and/or private entities.
- Providing preliminary space use and design options including Schematic level plans, sections and elevations.
- Provide preliminary projected development and construction costs.
- Provide an analysis of finance options including Public/Private funding opportunities.
- Provide an analysis of SFC's best use options including: full redevelopment, limited redevelopment or sale of property.
- Provide a Project Report and Recommendations to the SFC Board of County Commissioners on the best use of the property. Include statement on Economic, Social and Cultural impact on downtown Santa Fe for each option.

## **2. COMPENSATION AND INVOICING**

A. In consideration of its obligations under this Agreement the Contractor shall be compensated as follows:

- 1) The total amount payable to the Contractor under this Agreement shall not exceed \_\_\_\_\_ (\$ \_\_\_\_\_), exclusive of GRT. Any New Mexico gross receipts tax levied on the amounts payable under this Agreement shall be paid by the County to the Contractor.
- 2) This amount is a maximum and not a guarantee that the work assigned to be performed by Contractor under this Agreement shall equal the amount stated herein. The parties do not intend for the Contractor to continue to provide services without compensation when the total compensation amount is reached. Contractor is responsible for notifying the County when the services provided under this Agreement reach the total compensation amount. In no event will the Contractor be paid for services provided in excess of the total compensation amount without this Agreement being amended in writing prior to services being provided.

B. The Contractor shall submit a written request for payment to the County when payment is due under this Agreement. Upon the County's receipt of the written request, the County shall issue a written certification of complete or partial acceptance or rejection of the contractual items or services for which payment is sought. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the County may not make any payment hereunder unless and until it has issued a written certification accepting the contractual items or services. Within thirty (30) days of the issuance of a written certification accepting the contractual items or services, the County shall

tender payment for the accepted items or services. In the event the County fails to tender payment within thirty (30) days of the written certification accepting the items or services, the County shall pay late payment charges of one and one-half percent (1.5%) per month, until the amount due is paid in full.

C. In the event the Contractor breaches this Agreement, the County may, without penalty, withhold any payments due the Contractor for the purpose of set-off until such time as the County determines the exact amount of damages it suffered as a result of the breach.

D. Payment under this Agreement shall not foreclose the right of the County to recover excessive or illegal payment.

### **3. EFFECTIVE DATE AND TERM**

This Agreement shall, upon due execution by all parties, become effective as of the date first written above and shall terminate one year later, unless earlier terminated pursuant to Sections 5 (Termination) or 6 (Appropriations) of this Agreement. The County has the option to renew this Agreement for one (1) additional year. The County will exercise this option by submitting a written notice to the Contractor in no less than sixty (60) days prior to the expiration of the initial term of this Agreement. In no event shall the term of this Agreement exceed two (2) years from the effective date of the Agreement without this Agreement being amended in writing.

### **4. ADDITIONAL SERVICES**

- A. The parties agree that all services set forth in Section 1 (Scope of Services) of this Agreement shall be completed in full, to the satisfaction of the County, in accordance with industry standards and County Ordinance 1991-6, for the amounts set forth in Section 2 of this Agreement, and for no other cost, amount, fee or expense.
- B. The County may from time to time request changes in the Scope of Services to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the Contractor's compensation, which are mutually agreed upon by and between the County and the Contractor, shall be incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement.

### **5. TERMINATION**

- A. Termination of Agreement for Cause. Either party may terminate the Agreement based upon any material breach of this Agreement by the other party. The non-breaching party shall give the breaching party written notice of termination specifying the grounds for the termination. The termination shall be effective thirty (30) days from the breaching party's receipt of the notice of termination, during which time the breaching party shall have the right to cure the breach. If, however, the breach cannot

with due diligence be cured within thirty (30) days, the breaching party shall have a reasonable time to cure the breach, provided that, within thirty (30) days of its receipt of the written notice of termination, the breaching party began to cure the breach and advised the non-breaching party in writing that it intended to cure.

- B. Termination for Convenience of the County. The County may, in its discretion, terminate this Agreement at any time for any reason by giving the Contractor written notice of termination. The notice shall specify the effective date of termination, which shall not be less than sixty (60) days from the Contractor's receipt of the notice. The County shall pay the Contractor for acceptable services, determined in accordance with the specifications and standards set forth in this Agreement, performed before the effective date of termination but shall not be liable for any work or services performed on or after the effective date of termination.
- C. Termination for Convenience by Contractor. The Contractor may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving the County written notice of termination. The notice shall specify the effective date of termination which shall not be less than sixty (60) days from the County's receipt of the notice and shall be of sufficient advance notice so as to give the County sufficient and reasonable time to secure the services of another contractor, or otherwise make arrangement for continued animal boarding services for animals impounded by the County. In no event shall Contractor's stated effective date of termination for convenience be less than sixty (60) days from the date of the County's receipt of Contractor's written notice.
- D. In the event the County or Contractor terminates pursuant to this Section 5 with an effective date of termination that is a date between the first and last of a month, the compensation to be paid to the Contractor shall be the monthly compensation prorated daily to the day before the stated effective date of termination.

## 6. **APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZATIONS**

This Agreement is contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorizations being made for performance of this Agreement by the Board of County Commissioners of the County and/or, if state funds are involved, the Legislature of the State of New Mexico. If sufficient appropriations and authorizations are not made in this or future fiscal years, this Agreement shall terminate upon written notice by the County to the Contractor. Such termination shall be without penalty to the County, and the County shall have no duty to reimburse the Contractor for expenditures made in the performance of this Agreement. The County is expressly not committed to expenditure of any funds until such time as they are programmed, budgeted, encumbered and approved for expenditure by the County. The County's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations and authorizations have been made for the fulfillment of this Agreement shall be final and not subject to challenge by the Contractor in any way or forum, including a lawsuit

## 7. **INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR**

The Contractor and its agents and employees are independent contractors and are not employees or agents of the County. Accordingly, the Contractor and its agents and employees shall not accrue leave, participate in retirement plans, insurance plans, or liability bonding, use the County vehicles, or participate in any other benefits afforded to employees of the County. Except as may be expressly authorized elsewhere in this Agreement, the Contractor has no authority to bind, represent, or otherwise act on behalf of the County and agrees not to purport to do so.

**8. ASSIGNMENT**

The Contractor shall not assign or transfer any interest in this Agreement or assign any claims for money due or to become due under this Agreement without the advance written approval of the County. Any attempted assignment or transfer without the County's advance written approval shall be null and void and without any legal effect.

**9. SUBCONTRACTING**

The Contractor shall not subcontract or delegate any portion of the services to be performed under this Agreement without the advance written approval of the County. Any attempted subcontracting or delegating without the County's advance written approval shall be null and void and without any legal effect.

**10. PERSONNEL**

- A. All work performed under this Agreement shall be performed by the Contractor or under its supervision.
- B. The Contractor represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required to discharge its obligations under this Agreement. Such personnel (i) shall not be employees of nor have any contractual relationships with the County and (ii) shall be fully qualified and licensed or otherwise authorized or permitted under federal, state, and local law to perform such work.

**11. RELEASE**

Upon its receipt of all payments due under this Agreement, the Contractor releases the County, its Elected Officials, officers, agents and employees from all liabilities, claims, and obligations whatsoever arising from or under or relating to this Agreement.

**12. CONFIDENTIALITY**

Any confidential information provided to or developed by the Contractor in the performance of this Agreement shall be kept confidential and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by the Contractor without prior written approval of the County.

**13. CONFLICT OF INTEREST**

The Contractor represents that it has no and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, that would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

**14. INDEMNIFICATION**

- A. The Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the County and its Elected Officials, agents, and employees from any losses, liabilities, damages, demands, suits, causes of action, judgments, costs or expenses (including but not limited to court costs and attorneys' fees) resulting from or directly or indirectly arising out of the Contractor's performance or non-performance of its obligations under this Agreement, including but not limited to the Contractor's breach of any representation or warranty made herein.
- B. The Contractor agrees that the County shall have the right to control and participate in the defense of any such demand, suit, or cause of action concerning matters that relate to the County and that such suit will not be settled without the County's consent, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld. If a conflict exists between the interests of the County and the Contractor in such demand, suit, or cause of action, counsel shall be retained to represent the County's interest.
- C. The Contractor's obligations under this section shall not be limited by the provisions of any insurance policy the Contractor is required to maintain under this Agreement.

**15. RECORDS AND INSPECTIONS**

- A. To the extent its books and records relate to (i) its performance of this Agreement or any subcontract entered into pursuant to it or (ii) cost or pricing data (if any) set forth in this Agreement or that was required to be submitted to the County as part of the procurement process, the Contractor agrees to (i) maintain such books and records during the term of this Agreement and for a period of six (6) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement; (ii) allow the County or its designee to

audit such books and records at reasonable times and upon reasonable notice; and (iii) to keep such books and records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (“GAAP”).

- B. To the extent its books and records relate to (i) its performance of this Agreement or any subcontract entered into pursuant to it or (ii) cost or pricing data (if any) set forth in this Agreement or that was required to be submitted to County as part of the procurement process, the Contractor also agrees to require any subcontractor it may hire to perform its obligations under this Agreement to (i) maintain such books and records during the term of this Agreement and for a period of six (6) years from the date of final payment under the subcontract; (ii) to allow the County or its designee to audit such books and records at reasonable times and upon reasonable notice; and (iii) to keep such books and records in accordance with GAAP.

**16. PERMITS, FEES, AND LICENSES**

The Contractor shall procure all permits and licenses, pay all charges, fees, and royalties, and give all notices necessary and incidental to the due and lawful performance of its obligations hereunder.

**17. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY COMPLIANCE**

- A. The Contractor agrees to abide by all Federal, State, and local laws, ordinances, and rules and regulations pertaining to equal opportunity and unlawful discrimination. Without in any way limiting the foregoing general obligation, the Contractor specifically agrees not to discriminate against any person with regard to employment with the Contractor or participation in any program or activity offered pursuant to this Agreement on the grounds of race, age, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, physical or mental handicap, serious medical condition, spousal affiliation, sexual orientation, or gender identity.
- B. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that failure to comply with this Section shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

**18. SEVERABILITY**

If any term or condition of this Agreement shall be held invalid or non-enforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected and shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent of the law.

**19. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAW; CHOICE OF LAW**

- A. In performing its obligation hereunder, the Contractor shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, and obligations.

- B. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New Mexico, without regard to its choice of law rules. The Contractor and the County agree that the exclusive forum for any litigation between them arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be the federal and state district courts of New Mexico, located in Santa Fe County.

**20. NOTICE OF PENALTIES**

The Procurement Code, NMSA 1978, Section 13-1-28 through 13-1-199, imposes civil and criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities, and kickbacks.

**21. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES**

This Agreement was not intended to and does not create any rights in any persons not a party hereto.

**22. FACSIMILE SIGNATURES**

The parties hereto agree that a facsimile signature has the same force and effect as an original for all purposes.

**23. NEW MEXICO TORT CLAIMS ACT**

No provision of this Agreement modifies or waives any sovereign immunity or limitation of liability enjoyed by the County or its “public employees” at common law or under the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, NMSA 1978, § 41-4-1, et seq.

**24. INSURANCE**

- A. General Conditions. The Contractor shall submit evidence of insurance as is required herein. Policies of insurance shall be written by companies authorized to write such insurance in New Mexico.
- B. General Liability Insurance, Including Automobile. The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Agreement a comprehensive general liability and automobile insurance policy with liability limits in amounts not less than \$1,050,000 combined single limits of liability for bodily injury, including death, and property damage for any one occurrence. Said policies of insurance shall include coverage for all operations performed for the County by the Contractor; coverage for the use of all owned, non-owned, hired automobiles, vehicles and other equipment, both on and off work; and contractual liability coverage under

which this Agreement is an insured contract. The County of Santa Fe shall be a named additional insured on the policy.

- C. Workers' Compensation Insurance. The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act.
- D. Increased Limits. If, during the life of this Agreement, the Legislature of the State of New Mexico increases the maximum limits of liability under the Tort Claims Act (NMSA 1978, Sections 41-4-1 through 41-4-29, as amended), the Contractor shall increase the maximum limits of any insurance required herein

**25. CONTRACTOR'S REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES**

The Contractor hereby represents and warrants that:

- A. It is a corporation duly organized and in good standing under the laws of the State of New Mexico.
- B. This Agreement has been duly authorized by the Contractor, the person executing this Agreement has authority to do so, and, once executed by the Contractor, this Agreement shall constitute a binding obligation of the Contractor.
- C. This Agreement and the Contractor's obligations hereunder do not conflict with the Contractor's articles of incorporation or by-laws or any corporate resolution adopted by the Contractor.

**26. CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION DISCLOSURE FORM**

The Contractor agrees to compute and submit simultaneous with execution of this Agreement a Campaign Contribution Disclosure Form approved by the County.

**27. NOTICES**

**28. SURVIVAL**

The provisions of Sections 6, 8, 10, 14, 18, 21, 23, 26 and 29 shall survive termination of this Contract.

**29. NO ORAL MODIFICATIONS; WRITTEN AMENDMENTS REQUIRED**

This Agreement may not be modified, altered, changed, or amended orally but, rather, only by an instrument in writing executed by the parties hereto. The Contractor specifically acknowledges and agrees that the County shall not be responsible for any changes to Section 1 (Scope of Services) of this Agreement unless such changes are set forth in a duly executed written amendment to this Agreement.

**30. ENTIRE AGREEMENT; INTEGRATION**

This Agreement incorporates all the agreements, covenants, and understandings between the parties hereto concerning the subject matter hereof, and all such agreements, covenants and understandings have been merged into this written Agreement. No prior or contemporaneous agreement, covenant or understandings, verbal or otherwise, of the parties or their agents shall be valid or enforceable unless embodied in this Agreement.
