1. A. This special meeting of the Santa Fe Board of County Commissioners was called to order at approximately 2:00 p.m. by Chair Hank Hughes in the County Commission Chambers, 102 Grant Avenue, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

**B. Roll Call**

Roll was called by Deputy County Jennifer Wilson and indicated the presence of a quorum as follows:

**C. Approval of the Agenda**

CHAIR HUGHES: Manager Shaffer, are there any changes to the agenda?

GREG SHAFFER (County Manager): No, Mr. Chair.

CHAIR HUGHES: All right. Could I have a motion on the agenda.

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: Mr. Chair, I move to approve.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Second. .

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, all in favor.

**The motion passed by unanimous [4-0] voice vote.**

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, with a motion by Commissioner Hamilton and second by Commissioner Hansen, we've approved the agenda and we'll move on to 2.A.

CHAIR HUGHES: And I see we have Deputy County Manager Cordova to start us off, thank you.

LEANDRO CORDOVA (Deputy County Manager): Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and Commissioners. Thank you for convening today for this special meeting to discuss our congressionally delegated spending. We are a little bit earlier than last year on this. We haven't received official deadlines from Congresswoman Leger Fernandez or Senator Lujan, but we do have a deadline from Senator Heinrich's office of March 8<sup>th</sup> and that's why we wanted to have this special meeting to make sure that we're ahead of that particular deadline.

I won't read through my entire memo but I will hit on a few of the points. The summary of this is that we are looking at our Congressionally Directed Spending and Community Project Funding requests for Fiscal Year 25 in anticipation that this will be authorized. As I mentioned, we haven't gotten official word yet from all three offices and it hasn't come down from the delegation, in general, to give us guidance but they are anticipating it will happen again so that is why we're here today.

I also will mention that last's year spending for fiscal year 24 has not been authorized at the federal level as they still haven't passed the budget. So we haven't received anything that was anticipated for 2024 as of yet because we're still waiting for them to pass the budget in Washington.

A little bit of background: similar to the past few years our congressional delegation has requested of us to take a look at a few different funding categories/buckets of funding sort of speak, for us to pursue some of our requests. As I mentioned a couple of times, we do not have final numbers in terms of appropriations that have been committed or set aside, however, in the past three years, the County has submitted different project applications for various road, facility, water and wastewater projects. Projects were then identified through a subgroup of the Capital Planning Committee, to include Public Works, Growth Management/Planning, Housing Authority Division, and the County Manager Office which reviewed existing capital project requests and selected possible projects in the past.

This year, we did have the opportunity to speak with staff from both Senator Heinrich's office and Senator Lujan's office. We had members of Senator Heinrich's staff do a tour of our La Sala facility awhile back and it was pretty straight forward that there was a request of the Senator's office to put in a request for Congressionally Directed Spending for the La Sala program. You'll see that that is one of the operational programs that we put on our list this year. It's not a capital project, per se, but it would help supplement and expand the work that is being done at La Sala.

In the past we've been fortunate to receive funding specific to our County Housing Authority. In Fiscal Year 22 just over \$1 million, \$1,044,172 for re-roofing and in Fiscal Year we received \$1,212,000 for the re-stucco. Those two appropriations are

almost here. It's taken pretty much all of that time and a lot of work with our staff, Jordan, and our Housing Authority has been working with them and I think we're really close to getting a grant agreement to actually have the funds come over so we can put them to use. But it has taken a little bit longer than we had anticipated, especially for the 22 monies. That's a little bit in terms of the background and the history.

For this year, as I indicated, La Sala was a specific request of Senator Heinrich who is really impressed with the program so we have developed a programmatic request for that.

Also in discussion with staff from Senator Lujan's office, it was recommended that we request some money perhaps to help us with our PFAS testing in different parts of the County but probably specific at this time La Cienega knowing what we're dealing with in that area. That is another project that is on the list that isn't necessarily tied to a capital project but was mentioned and does fit into one of the categories that was presented to us so we did provide a project for that initiative and effort.

I'm going to quickly go through the projects as proposed. Santa Fe County La Sala support program, we're requesting a total of \$1.2 million. That will help with an expansion of harm reduction services which would include the distribution of Narcan, outreach, and follow-up services after a drug overdoses. Again, the program that we have, this will help supplement and expand that to a certain degree but it will just really help make sure that we're maintaining our level of service and doing the best we can in that program.

Another idea/request that came from Sustainability was doing a Public Works solar project over the parking lot. The estimated cost of that would be \$420,000. We would be requesting the funding to install a PV system as I mentioned over the new parking lot at Public Works Complex. It would offset approximately 65 percent of the energy used at the facility saving over \$30,000 in utility expenses annually. That is the type of project that certainly coincides with our other efforts and some of the strategic planning initiatives put forth. It's also a project on our ICIP.

Our third project PFAS contaminants, well testing, monitoring and treatment options for individual homeowners. We're asking for \$1 million on that. I will mention at this time that some of the guidance that we did get was to keep our projects around the \$1 million mark or under. Anything above that is viewed more as a regional or statewide initiative and that's where the bigger money goes towards those types of initiatives that has a broader reach. So we did kind of keep most of our requests to the \$1.2 million and under amount. So for that particular project I mentioned a project cost of \$1 million it will help us to do private well water testing, point of entry treatment or point of use treatment systems for individual property owners and would most likely run through our Developers Assistance Program as we're developing it. And it would also supplement our other efforts that we're putting into that effort.

Our forth project on the list is a repeat from last year. Our RECC Radio Project. We decided to try and ask for this again as some of the other awards around the state last year proved that there was interest in funding things like radio projects and public safety. So we did lower the amount somewhat to continue to help with the cobbling together of funds. We did receive some State Appropriation Funds and hopefully that will make it all the way through along with whatever County funds that we're putting in. Whatever

we got would just help us continue to work on the project and get that project complete.

And then the fifth project, because we've had so much success in the past, we continued with the request for public housing upgrades. Even with the funding that we've gotten in the past, there is still plenty of need and we maintain the same request as last year for another \$1.26 million. As I mentioned for our 24 we received an indication that we received \$500,000 from Congresswoman Teresa Leger Fernandez' office; however, we're still waiting for the budget to be approved so that that can eventually make it to us. Hopefully, there won't be any loss of that fund within the budget at that time. But if they give us another \$500,000 we would put it straight into the efforts that we've been doing and put it right to use.

That's a quick summation of where we're at with the memo. Our recommended action is to request authorization for us to move forward in submitting applications for these identified projects as well as to listen to any other requests or initiatives from the Board at this time and see if there's a chance that we can use the little extra time that we have to make any of that a possibility. And I'll stand for questions at this time if there are any.

#### **B. Discussion of Commissioner Priorities**

CHAIR HUGHES: All right. Thank you and I have a bunch of questions but let's see what the other Board members have first. They probably have the same questions I do. Questions from the Board? Commissioner Hansen.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Thank you, Leandro, for that overview. I think all of these projects are good projects. Have we ever gotten any federal money for the Agua Fria sewer wastewater project from the feds?

MR. CORDOVA: Not in the last couple funding cycles that I'm aware of. I don't think so.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Did we ask?

MR. CORDOVA: No, we did not ask last year. That wasn't on our list last year. I think the concern with that is that we're moving really quickly on that project at this point and we're going to continue the work. As I mentioned, the money from these requests don't come quickly.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Right, they take a long time.

MR. CORDOVA: It does.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: And that's unfortunate. And I think that the PFAS well testing is actually really quite important and something that maybe needs to be done sooner rather than later but since it's federal money there's not an Anti-Donation Clause; isn't that correct?

MR. CORDOVA: I believe that that's one of the hopes and one of the opportunities with requesting this fund. We also, as mentioned earlier, will continue moving forward with our efforts at the County level. This wasn't identified specific to La Cienega either because if the other issues come up around the County and we have excess funds it would give us an opportunity to address other area if need be.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: And then I'm very happy to hear that Senator Heinrich has visited the La Sala project and I think, as I said earlier, I think that

all of these are important. Clearly, Representative Leger Fernandez likes supporting our public housing and I think it's just unfortunate for how long it takes for us to get federal money. I'll leave it there for now.

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, thank you. Are there other questions on the other side? Commissioner Bustamante.

COMMISSIONER BUSTAMANTE: I do, thank you. I understand the question and the conversations regarding Agua Fria and looking at the big picture in a lot of the conversations coming up of what can we do? And you said that this isn't tied to any capital request. But in time, it seems that as we identify the problem and it's already been a request of what it would take to get County water and sewer into the La Cieneguilla area. That being said, my answer has been that we've had Agua Fria on the list for awhile, so is there a way that we can start looking comprehensively at what type of funding, if it's not through this avenue, and start to maybe realize and come to the understanding that we're going to need to be pro-active – being late for leaving early – we're going to be late for being pro-active for something that could possibly be mitigated particularly in the Agua Fria area. I don't know if this is more of a statement than it is a question but we want to start thinking about what it's going to take to have those resources and infrastructure and it's not as simple as that but that's part of it for sure.

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Bustamante, I hear you and I understand that we are looking at a lot more than just what's in front of us at the moment.

CHAIR HUGHES: Thank you. Commissioner Hamilton.

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair. First of all, I think it's a good selection of projects. Good thought into why we picked some of these and they are all worthwhile. I guess I just wanted to confirm things that I am assuming. I think that this is the way it has happened in the past, it's not an all or nothing package. We are putting the whole package in but they can fund one or more of the projects without funding all of it.

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hamilton, yes. Basically, the different categories allow us to put in an application for each of these projects in the different categories. It is still a competitive process and nothing is guaranteed but with this list we would like to request authorization to apply for all of them in each category and see what we might be able to get.

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: Yes. So there are actually several individual applications and they can approve one and not the other.

MR. CORDOVA: Yes.

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: And as a result, we're not really required to prioritize the list because they're just all each in an independent application.

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hamilton, yes, they are in no particular order.

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: That's great. That makes a lot of sense to me. Thanks very much.

CHAIR HUGHES: All right, thank you. I have a couple of questions and following up on what Commissioner Hamilton said, do we send this whole list to each legislator or do we only Heinrich the La Sala one for example?

MR. CORDOVA: As I understand it, we'll have to apply through each

category specific to each project which is the intention. We'll apply for each of these projects within each category and then let our congressional leaders know that we applied for them. In other words, La Sala Operational Support would go to the Health and Human Services bucket. We would apply for that and we would apply for all of them in their different buckets and then let Senator Heinrich know that we've now put five applications including La Sala, it's now in the competitive process.

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, I understand now. And then a question about La Sala. I think it would be great to get some money for operations but will that commit us to then using our own money later on to continue whatever work has started? In other words, I think the reason we usually ask for capital projects is that you pay for it and then you're done and then that's it. With operational funding, let's say we fund \$1 million harm reduction program and it's really great and wonderful, are we thinking that we would then fund it out of our own money going forward? What's the thinking there?

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chairman, as I understand it in discussions with Director O'Connor, this will supplement what we're doing. It will give us an opportunity to expand for a short time and do extra while not necessarily committing to the long term. What we have in existing operating, it will just grow our pool and if it shrinks again, we will continue to keep operating at current levels. So it shouldn't be detrimental to our future. It should just help us supplement what we're doing currently.

RACHEL O'CONNOR (Community Services Division Director, via Webex): Leandro, if I could just add something to that. I might be coming from the hinterlands here; but can you hear me?

CHAIR HUGHES: Yes, we hear you.

MS. O'CONNOR: I just wanted to add a little bit to that. The La Sala program is operated by New Mexico Solutions and we are tapering off every year some of the funding that we give them. We started at \$1.6 million. This year they will get \$1.2 million. However, they want to expand some of the services. So we would temporarily reduce the amount of money that we're giving them should the Congressionally Directed Funding come in and continue to seek long-term funding services for some of the expanded ideas that they have. They are really growing rapidly. But I don't perceive that we would be asked to pick up expenses that exceed our capabilities in the future.

CHAIR HUGHES: Thank you for that additional clarification. And, again, I think that this is great. I was just curious about that.

MS. O'CONNOR: It's a good question.

CHAIR HUGHES: Just so you know, I was willing to commit us to long-term funding if we needed it. But I didn't think that you would have suggested it if it meant we had to do that.

MS. O'CONNOR: Thank you.

CHAIR HUGHES: My last question is do we have a particular target for Representative Leger Fernandez that we're thinking of? I know that La Sala is Senator Heinrich's pet project and the PFAS would be Senator Lujan's pet project; do we know what Representative Leger Fernandez is particularly interested in?

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chairman, based on the past funding it does appear that public housing is something that she has funded in the past and that's part of why we left that project on there for this year. Hopefully, that that is something that was funded

in the past that might be something that will be of interest this year in going forward. We haven't had an opportunity to have as in-depth of a discussion with her or her staff as we did with the senators. We still have a little time to do that. This hopefully, will be the type of project that will capture her interest.

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, and is there any chance that we would get all of these funded? Are each of them going to give us \$1 million and therefore we're going to get around \$3 million.

MR. CORDOVA: Mr. Chairman, I'd say that it is highly unlikely but we'll definitely keep our fingers crossed and hope. But I don't think that we would get the entire ask. However, whatever we got we would be able to use and that was part of how we identified these projects as they are. Whatever we got for them would be able to put to use and probably take way from County funds that would have otherwise had to be committed.

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay. And it looks like to me, just looking at this, eyeballing it, I think we're asking from more than \$3,140,000 because three of the projects are already \$1 million and then two of them are \$500,000. So I think the adding is incorrect.

MR. CORDOVA: You are correct. That is incorrect. I apologize for that error. We'll fix that.

CHAIR HUGHES: We'll just have to fix that before you do it. All right, those were my questions. Any other questions? Okay, we have done our discussion.

**C. Request Approval to Submit Congressionally Directed Spending Applications for Fiscal Year 2025**

CHAIR HUGHES: Manager Shaffer, would the approval be in the form of a motion?

MANAGER SHAFFER: Yes, thank you, Mr. Chair. I think that would be adequate for staff's purposes.

CHAIR HUGHES: And unfortunately Commissioner Greene is coming up on half-hour late so he may indeed miss the whole thing which is too bad. Would somebody like to make a motion?

COMMISSIONER HAMILTON: Mr. Chair, I would move to approve this recommended list of actions to proceed with applications on.

COMMISSIONER BUSTAMANTE: Second.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Second.

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, we have a motion from Commissioner Hamilton and a multiple seconds. I think I heard from Commissioner Bustamante first by about a 1/10 of a second. All in favor.

**The motion passed by unanimous [4-0] voice vote.**

CHAIR HUGHES: Okay, by a vote of four to zero, the motion passes.

**3. Concluding Business**



**A. Announcements**

*[Exhibit 1: Bills signed as of 3/4/24 and bills still pending action]*

CHAIR HUGHES: Are there any announcements?

MANAGER SHAFFER: Two. First, we were asked to provide the Board with some updated information relative to the bills that are pending the Governor. Sara Smith is going to handout two different charts. The first identifies every bill that has been signed by the Governor and chaptered and therefore will become law in accordance with the constitution or specified effective date. And, then secondly, the additional list identifies those same projects in yellow but also highlights, by not highlighting them, those bills that are still pending action by the Governor.

Secondly, I wanted to give you a heads-up that the County Tourism Division in conjunction with our consultant will be releasing a tourism news release that celebrates legendary women of Santa Fe County's past in conjunction with Women's History Month. This is an initial effort to celebrate the accomplishment of women associated with Santa Fe County with particular emphasis on tourism-related attractions and so as you see the news release you'll see that Georgia O'Keeffe, Mary Cabot Wheelwright, as well as Leonora Frances Curtin are highlighted and the tourist-related attractions associated with those historic women. It's an effort both to celebrate again their historic accomplishments but all also tie it directly to tourism and finally we call out in the press release the Historic Marker Initiative that is undertaken with the State of New Mexico. So I wanted to let you know what the background was to this press release and as we potentially replicate this in future years then we'll continue to search for women to celebrate in conjunction, again, with tourism-related attractions within the state. So those are the updates that we had.

CHAIR HUGHES: Thank you. And I think that Hvtce wants to tell us a little bit more about the legislation. Go ahead.

HVTCE MILLER (County Manager's Office): Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and Commissioners. Feels like I was just here a week ago. What was passed out *[Exhibit 1]* to you is a fairly simple report showing the legislation which has been signed into law. The first two pages shows all of the 53 bills that have currently been signed into law by the Governor and a little bit more detail of when it was signed and in what order these were signed in. They were signed in groups of different, I would say, subject matters. Just yesterday there was a signing at the high school and there was a signing of several different crime bills. And on the second two pages, pages 3 and 4, this is the list showing you – this is a little more easier to look at and understanding of where bills are in relation to them being executed or not. Everything highlighted in yellow is the bill that has been signed into law and if it's not highlighted we're still waiting the Governor's signature for those pieces of legislation. So of the 72, we're still waiting on 18 bills that need signature. Nine on the House side and then eight on the Senate side.

And then going back to the calendar, tomorrow is the deadline at 5:00 for legislation to be signed off on and anything not specifically vetoed will be pocket vetoed. Additionally, no items currently have been vetoed by the Governor, none of the 72 bills. So if anything further occurs, I will let you know. But just to add on a little bit more, looking through the list of those that have not been signed off on yet, it looks like most of

the budget items and also some of the environmental bills, for instance, House Bill 41, clean transportation fuel standards and House bill 91, fuel thermal resources project funds. And with that if you have any particular questions, I'll be happy to address them as best I can.

CHAIR HUGHES: Thank you very much. And I do understand that the Governor was supposed to sign the Clean Transportation Fuel Standards this morning – that's why my wife had to get to work on time. She was invited to watch that. Are there any questions or comments? Commissioner Hansen.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: So is there any word, is she going to sign the budget bill?

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hansen, I haven't received word that she would go back into special session or anything like that to redo the budgets. The one item was a house floor amendment which I think she might be upset about which was they put in an amendment to restrict any use of the public education budget to implement her 180-day school calendar. She was going for the five-days a week and that amendment basically tied her hands as to how she could use the state budget to implement a five-day a week for school districts. Other than that --

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Can she line-item veto that?

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hansen, that was a question that was being actually looked at while they were proposing the amendment and the way it was drafted they were trying to not allow that to happen but there is always a lot of time to re-examine things after a bill has been passed. So I wouldn't leave it out of the realm of possibilities.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: And then it doesn't look like she has signed any of the capital outlay bills.

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hansen that is correct.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: How long does she have – until tomorrow what time; 5:00, midnight?

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hansen, yes, 5:00.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Okay, by 5:00 tomorrow night we'll know if we're going to have a special session or not.

MR. MILLER: Yes, based on that a special session for the budget I would say. But I haven't received any word that there were any issues or questions regarding any of the County projects which we had contained in the bill, Senate Bill 275. And even on the last day, I was getting questions from the senate side just to make sure that they were putting in the exact language that it was being appropriated to the right entity, whether that be City, County or State agencies. I would say our projects with a fair amount of confidence will make it through.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Okay.

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Hansen, I'll make sure and – I'm not going to make you wait another week. I'll text you by 5:00 tomorrow to let you know that the capital outlay and the budget itself are passed and I'll start examining to see what was struck through.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: And let us know what's not – I would like to know what she pocket vetoes and there's not very many, hopefully none, but it will be

interesting to see.

CHAIR HUGHES: All right. Any other questions or comments? Any other announcements on a different subject?

COMMISSIONER BUSTAMANTE: I have a question.

CHAIR HUGHES: Yes, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER BUSTAMANTE: Not to Hvtce. Thank you very much, Hvtce.

You know when we have the Celebrating Legendary Women of Santa Fe County's Past, I'm going to ask for more diversity in this list. I think it's very – these are folks we all know about and we don't do enough to recognize that there are other people who have had significant contributions within Santa Fe County. And, frankly, Mary Wheelwright was in Rio Arriba County. They did put in the Wheelwright museum but for that matter we had Maria the potter who had pots sold in Santa Fe for a long time and she was Rio Arriba. I just think that we need to do better by getting some diversity on this list. Thanks.

CHAIR HUGHES: I agree with that, Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER BUSTAMANTE: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: Mr. Chair.

CHAIR HUGHES: Yes, Commissioner Hansen.

COMMISSIONER HANSEN: I agree with that also. I think of Mary Wheelwright as somebody who definitively is associated with Rio Arriba County and Los Luceros which was her home in Rio Arriba County. But she does have the museum here.

The other thing that I wanted to bring up that maybe we could talk about at our next Board meeting is the Energy Efficiency Codes for 2021. I believe we have updated our codes to 2018. But new codes have been released for 2021 for energy efficiency so I would like to see us moving towards that and meet the state's standards so that we would be in line with the state again because they have approved the 2021 Energy Efficiency Code.


CHAIR HUGHES: I agree with you as well.
