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growing, the trees start growing, road signs get obscured, and especially speed limit signs, by trees. Like there's a couple of notorious ones on Rodeo, but they're all over the place. They're all over the place.

And I guess it's part city, county, but there doesn't seem to be a consistent maybe a team that's on the county or whatever road maintenance groups there are that just goes around and like, oh, there's something that's obstructed, we should clear that, and just pull over and do it rather than maybe doing it once a year or something. It's a very consistent problem I see.

And so people don't know what the speed limits are, and I see on Rodeo, for example, which the speed limit is 50, people going 30, 35, and it causes all kinds of backups and consternation. And there's been news stories lately about road rage on Rodeo from people not going fast enough or whatever. Anyway, so it's -- it's an issue. I just don't know how to get any movement on that, so I'm -- that was one of my questions.

MR. LANCASTER: This was a subject I never thought I'd broach, but hearing the discussion about detainees walking alongside of the road, a year ago my wife and I stopped, a woman was laying on the side of the road not far from the magistrate, and we worry all the time about people. It seems extraordinary, as if they are being punished by being made to walk there, and there should be some kind of shuttle to take these people safely in and out from the prison into town. It does not seem at all even civil to have them walking alongside the road.

I wanted to address a few things that Kiera brought up before we get to the Madrid safety project. I've been working with Brett closely on it, but I've also worked with district five and the DOT and run into some real problems in the town, and that is the dispute over right-of-ways. And this dispute over right-of-ways is making the town more hazardous.

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

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
