SUMMARY:

Chapter 3 of the SLDC gives the BCC the authority to appoint members of the Planning Commission. Section 3.3.3.1 states: "The Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, appointed by the Board. Planning Commission Members shall be registered voters of the County. One member shall reside in each of the Commission Districts in order to provide diversity of representation; the remaining members shall be at large and may reside in any area of the County and be nominated by any Commissioner." Section 3.3.3.2 goes on to state; "The initial members of the Planning Commission shall be the current members of the County Development Review Committee (CDRC), who shall serve out their remaining terms. Thereafter, terms of members of the Planning Commission shall be for two (2) years or until after their successors are appointed. Three (3) members shall be appointed in even numbered years and four (4) members shall be appointed in odd numbered years. Members shall serve for no more than three (3) consecutive terms..." (Exhibit A).

The terms of three of the current CDRC members will expire in January of 2018. One of the members represents Commission District 2, and the other two are at-large positions.

In November of 2017, the County sent out a press release seeking interested members of the general public to serve on the Planning Commission. We received responses from 13 individuals which includes 2 of the 3 current members who have requested reappointment.

Four of the applicants that submitted a letter of interest to serve on the Planning Commission reside in Commission District 2. This includes the current member, Mr. Charlie Gonzales, who is interested in serving another term.

- 3.2.1.12. To hear and rule on appeals from discretionary decisions of the Planning Commission.
- 3.2.2. Action and Appeals. The Board shall hold public hearings and issue development orders, on applications for legislative or discretionary development approval, except where a final development order is authorized to be issued by the Planning Commission. Where the Planning Commission has authority to issue a development order determining a matter, the Board shall have appellate authority to review such development order if an appeal is properly perfected by the Administrator, the owner/applicant, or any other person or entity with standing to appeal the development order, no more than thirty (30) days from the date of the development order.
- 3.2.3. Conflict of Interest: Quasi-Judicial Proceedings. A member of the Board of County Commissioners shall not vote or participate in any discretionary development matter pending before the Board as specified in County Code of Conduct.

3.3. PLANNING COMMISSION.

- **3.3.1.** Creation and Responsibilities. There is hereby created a County Planning Commission ("Planning Commission") which shall have the responsibilities and duties specified in the SLDC and in NMSA 1978, § 3-19-1 *et. seq.* (1965) (as amended) and NMSA 1978, § 3-21-1 *et seq.* (1965) (as amended).
- 3.3.2. Duties and Powers of the Planning Commission. The duties and authority of the Planning Commission are as follows:
 - 3.3.2.1. To perform the functions specified in NMSA 1978, §§ 3-19-1 and 3-21-7 (1965);
 - **3.3.2.2.** To review and recommend to the Board, for adoption, text and map amendments to the SLDC, SGMP amendments and the adoption and amendment of an Official Map, a Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP") and other programs for public improvements and services and financing;
 - **3.3.2.3.** To hold public hearings and prepare written recommendations to the Board on certain discretionary development approvals subject to appeal to the Board in the matters designated in Table 4-1;
 - **3.3.2.4.** To hold public hearings and recommend action on an area, district or community Plan, final development orders, and quasi-judicial discretionary development applications;
 - **3.3.2.5.** To hold public hearings and take final action and issue development orders regarding applications for variances and conditional use permits; and
 - **3.3.2.6.** To enter upon any land that is the subject of an application that is the subject of this ordinance, make examinations and surveys, and place and maintain necessary monuments and markers upon the land pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 3-19-4, upon reasonable notice of not less than seventy two (72) hours to the owner/applicant or designated agent of the land to be entered, and after adoption of an order authorizing the time, place and location of the entry onto land or site examination.
 - 3.3.2.7. To make decisions on appeals from final decisions of the Administrator.



3.3.3. Membership and Terms.

- 3.3.3.1. Number; Appointments; Residency. The Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, appointed by the Board. Planning Commission members shall be registered voters of the County. One member shall reside in each of the Commission Districts in order to provide diversity of representation; the remaining members shall be at large and may reside in any area of the County and be nominated by any Commissioner.
- 3.3.3.2. Terms and Removal. The initial members of the Planning Commission shall be the current members of the County Development Review Committee, who shall serve out their remaining terms. Thereafter, terms of members of the Planning Commission shall be for two (2) years or until their successors are appointed. Three (3) members shall be appointed in even numbered years and four (4) members shall be appointed in odd numbered years. Members shall serve for no more than three (3) consecutive terms. Members may be removed by the Board after a public hearing solely for reasonable cause set forth in writing and made part of the public record.
- **3.3.3.3.** Vacancies. The Board shall appoint a person to fill a vacancy as soon as practicable after the vacancy is created.

3.3.4. Conduct of Planning Commission Business.

- **3.3.4.1. Officers; Quorum; Rules of Order.** The Planning Commission shall follow the Rules of Order established by the Board for the conduct of meetings in the County.
- **3.3.4.2.** Meetings. The Planning Commission shall meet at least once a month. All meetings of the Planning Commission shall be open to the public. Notice of such meetings shall be given in accordance with the applicable Board approved resolution establishing statutory notice for public meetings.
- **3.3.4.3. Minutes and Other Records.** The County Clerk shall keep minutes of the proceedings of the Planning Commission, which shall reflect the vote on each matter put to a vote or, if a member is absent or fails to vote, reflect such fact; and such other records as are necessary to memorialize its transactions, findings, recommendations, resolutions, determinations and development orders, all of which shall be filed in the Office of the County Clerk.
- **3.3.4.4.** Conflict of Interest. A member of the Planning Commission shall not vote or participate in any discretionary development matter pending before the Planning Commission as specified in the County Code of Conduct.
- 3.3.4.5. Recommendations and Development Orders. The Planning Commission shall not make a recommendation or take final action on any matter without first considering evidence received from the Administrator, planning staff, a Hearing Officer, or owner/applicant, reports of the pre-application neighborhood meeting, other persons with standing, tribal governments, and other county, regional, state or federal departments or agencies, as determined by law.

3.4. ADMINISTRATOR

3.4.1. Appointment. A person shall be appointed by the County Manager to serve as the Administrator. Where the SLDC assigns a responsibility to the Administrator, the Administrator may delegate that responsibility to any employee of the County.

BRIEF PRE-SUMMARY OF QUALIFICATIONS

I retired with the City of Santa Fe in January of 2010. My title was Technical Review Coordinator for the Land Use Department. I reviewed building permit applications, developments, subdivisions and complaints for compliance with the Escarpment Overlay District, FEMA Floodplains, Terrain Management and Landscaping. I also tracked all the letters of credit and escrow agreements for approved subdivisions, developments and permits. This also included inspections in the field for Terrain Management, FEMA Floodplains, Escarpment and Landscaping. I have attended and participated in all kinds of public and private hearings or meetings. The majority of the time I assisted the public and staff with coordination and simple explanations on technical issues. I was well liked by the public and staff. On January 27, 2010, I received an Official Proclamation from the City Council, for service to the Public, the City and the County. (Copy attached)

Currently I have been working under contract with Design Enginuity as an inspector and project manager. Sometimes I do landscape and irrigation design. I started there in April of 2011. I have inspected numerous projects which include tributaries of floodplains, erosion prevention/mitigation, bank stabilization, reseeding, re-vegetation of disturbed areas and subdivision infrastructure.

I wrote numerous letters for the code enforcement, technical review section and the development permits section and personally took responsibility for all projects, especially controversial projects and responded accordingly and /or attended community meetings and court. The department was very successful in the regulating of mining and reclamation. I left the County in 1998 and became a Project Manager for Tierra Contenta Corp. When I came back to the County in 1999, I caught Cerrillos Gravel Products Mining out of their limits and provided the documented information to the Board of County Commissioners, which resulted in the Development Permit being revoked. I was hired at the County of Santa Fe for my extensive experience and knowledge of terrain management, subdivisions/developments, Environmental requirements, F.E.M.A. requirements, Army Corps of Engineers requirements as well as local, state and national codes employed me. This division was responsible for reviewing and approving development permits, subdivisions/development inspections, coordinating pre-construction conferences, and reviewing/approving/tracking financial guarantees, drainage complaints, floodplain requirements, special review districts, reviewing/approving/inspecting the mining ordinance requirements and verifying licensed contractors. I am capable of conducting drafting for engineering, surveying and architectural.

Subdivisions: Maintained an accurate construction file on each subdivision or development under construction. Reviewed proposed plans and engineer's estimates for infrastructure improvements as well as redline corrections and change orders prior to final approval. Coordinated pre-construction conferences with utilities, contractors and developers. Verified quantities to release pay requests for improvements. 

The documents were written for all members of the highway safety community including engineers, planners, law enforcement officials, educators, judges, and other highway safety specialists in an effort to successfully coordinate safety efforts.

Senior Reviewer, Moody Porter Intersection Evaluation, TriMet, Portland, OR: 2015. Conducted senior review of pedestrian, bicycle, transit, and vehicular circulation at a transit station. The focus was to study the site in the field, but also including a brief overview of project concept plans particularly as they pertain to pedestrian, bicycle, and motor vehicle safety and operations. Also considered was the context of the adjacent street network, adjacent development and land uses, and the imminent plan to fully open this intersection to extensive transit activity — light rail, street car and bus use — all of which will use the new Tillikum Crossing Bridge to the west which is intended to exclusively serve non-motor vehicle users including pedestrians, bicycles and transit modes. Recommendations were made for primarily three modal areas — pedestrians, bicycles and motor vehicles to enhance safety, operations, provide clearer direction to users, and, in particular, to address the large numbers of pedestrians and bicycles — considering their interactions with Light Rail, Street Car, and bus operations.

Lead Safety Engineer; Red Rock Canyon Project Scoping and Project Delivery; Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)-Central Federal Lands (CFLHD); Las Vegas, NV; 2014. Performed a Road Safety Scan to address the BLM's concerns with interactions between pedestrians, bicyclists, and vehicles. CH2M developed the final design for the rehabilitation of the 13-mile scenic Loop Drive, a 3-mile return route on new alignment to reduce travel time, and safety improvements to 12 parking lots. A primary driver of the project is the high level of visitation and the mixed use of vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians. Safety and environmental preservation areas were high priorities identified during project scoping. After project scoping, CH2M facilitated decision making with the BLM and CFLHD to determine the first construction package, which had an accelerated schedule to meet funding deadlines. This package replaced two major

low water crossings with bridges and installed flood warning systems at the remaining three low water crossings to improve safety and reduce maintenance.

Quality Manager, New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT) Transparency Reports, New Mexico DOT 2012-2013. These federally-required projects identify the most prominent crash sites for various roadway types, jurisdictions, and locales (urban/rural) in New Mexico. The report contains at least 5 percent of roadways. Based on crash patterns, general countermeasures are also identified. CH2M produced the FY 2012 Transparency Report for the NMDOT, as required by the FHWA with the authorization of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA LU). The intent of the report is to describe at least 5 percent of the highway locations exhibiting the most severe safety needs for the public roads in each state. CH2M HILL also produced the FY 2011 and FY 2010 Transparency Reports.

Quality Manager, Evaluation of the Comprehensive Transportation Safety Plan (CTSP), New Mexico Department of Transportation, 2007 to 2009. CH2M HILL reviewed and evaluated the current CTSP at the time. Specifically, we completed a comprehensive literature search and state-of-the-practice survey to identify and assess best practices. We developed the criteria and format to review and identify emphasis areas and strategies from the current and past CTSP's that have proven effective. We conducted research to determine if the recent decline in traffic fatalities and serious injuries has been the result of implementing the CTSP; validating or invalidating whether the performance measures of the current CTSP align with the emphasis areas and appropriate strategies; developing strategies to effectively manage the current CTSP and future versions; and developing a tracking system that can be used to measure progress and effectiveness with current and future CTSP emphasis areas and appropriate strategies.

Quality Manager, Traffic Calming Manual, City of Albuquerque, NM: 2012 to 2015. CH2M HILL developed a Traffic Calming Manual for the City of Albuquerque. The intent of this City-wide policy is to better manage neighborhood traffic, address citizen concerns, and outline a process on how traffic calming projects are identified, prioritized, and implemented. The CH2M HILL team completed a comprehensive literature search and state-of-the-practice survey to identify and assess traffic calming best practices. Based on these practices, we worked with the City to build a "traffic calming toolbox" that can be utilized when the City determines that implementation of a measure is warranted. We also developed criteria and the format that will be used to review and identify requests for traffic calming implementation.

Project Manager; US 380 Corridor Study; Lincoln NM Historic District; New Mexico Department of Transportation; Lincoln, New Mexico; 2007. The project consisted of a ten-mile segment of US 380 located in the National Historic District. It served as the model for the NMDOT project with respect to the development of alternative mitigation measures meeting transportation needs that are sensitive and compatible with the local culture and environment. CH2M HILL is using a Context Sensitive Solutions (CSS process) to work with local and agency stakeholders that include the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service and the NM State Historic Preservation Office.

Senior Traffic Engineer; National Park System Comprehensive Traffic Safety Study; Central Federal Lands Highway Division, FHWA; 2005 to 2010. Served as senior technical lead responsible for the completion of a system-wide study of traffic safety for the entire National Park System (NPS). The effort, the first of its kind, consisted of an overall review of traffic crash patterns and characteristics for all types of crashes occurring in national parks. The final report identified recommendations for addressing traffic safety issues and reviews the crash experience for over 222 national parks during a 16-year period. The study considers not only motor vehicle safety issues but those related to pedestrians and bicyclists. The effort involved extensive interactions with stake holders such as NPS administrative staff in Washington DC, and FHWA Headquarters. The National Park System represents 49 states including the District of Columbia. In 2002, the parks had 421 million visitors and experienced over 110,000 accidents in a 16-year time span.

Instructor; Context Sensitive Solutions Training Course; National Highway Institute; Federal Highway Administration; 2006 to 2009. Served as Instructor nationally for a three-day training course sponsored by NHI for FHWA, and Federal Lands Highway Division. The objective of the course was to present the CSS framework and principles to state and local agency employees, including lessons and group case study exercises.

editions of the guide, development of the outline for the department design manual, served as chair of the Department Access Control Committee, was the Department representative on the NM State Tourism Board, and helped lead the effort for the establishment of routes for vehicles that transport low level radioactive waste to the WIPP storage facility in Carlsbad, New Mexico. The effort included analysis of routes utilizing methodologies developed by the DOE, consideration of emergency response issues, the preparation of a report which evaluated the recommended routes in the State of New Mexico, and review of public hearing comments and their disposition related to the route establishment. Other accomplishments included the development of a statewide consultant traffic signal program, new state access management procedures, and participation in the development of a new state subdivision act, and technical assistance with the legislature in developing a state "dark skies act".

Participated in the public involvement process regarding to design coordination with affected businesses, which entailed 15 public meetings to resolve access issues and identified safety concerns. The project ultimately included innovative access management designs which were acceptable to stake holders, new bicycle lanes, ITS improvements related to the signal system, and significant design accommodations for transit, and enhanced pedestrian improvements.

Managed and implemented the first traffic calming program and safety program for the city of Santa Fe. As lead staff person and manager, supervised and developed public process and design procedures for the traffic calming program which included over 45 projects at a cost of approximately 4 million. The extensive public process serves as a model for the City in terms of neighborhood involvement and project execution with more than 28 projects approved by neighborhoods as a result of over 100 meetings, and 22 or more constructed projects. The scope of these projects is to identify efforts that could be implemented in an expeditious manner at a relatively low cost.

Lead Traffic Design Engineer; Big "I" Concept Design Project; New Mexico Highway and Transportation Department; Albuquerque, New Mexico; 1995 to 1998. The project consists of the development of the concept design for the interchange of I-25 and I-40 in Albuquerque. The Big "I" is a major system interchange which by itself carries almost 10 % of the entire interstate traffic in Albuquerque. Previous studies had recommended designs which fell short of what state transportation planners and engineers felt would meet the needs of the traveling public. The \$250 million concept design included the elimination of all left hand off ramps though the addition of more desirable right hand off ramps, and the addition of frontage roads for all approaches to serve local traffic and provide for incident management options. Design challenges included a concept design which largely avoided existing ramps and major bridge structures, thereby greatly enhancing traffic control. Construction was accomplished within two years. The concept design developed required virtually no right-of-way acquisition. The constructability of the concept was in large part possible due to the development of an efficient traffic control plan, and careful design. A detailed traffic analysis which thoroughly evaluated geometric and traffic needs which permitted the project to be a design-build effort which saved funds and time.
