

Re: **APPOINTMENT/ REAPPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS TO THE COUNTY OPEN LANDS, TRAILS AND PARKS ADVISORY COMMITTEE (COLTPAC)**

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

Resolution 2011-4 provides that "members of COLTPAC shall be appointed by the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) based on letters of interest, qualifications, county-wide representation, and advices from Open Space and Trails Program staff. Members should be of diverse backgrounds, representative of the varied users of Santa Fe County open space, trails and parks. Desirable expertise among membership of the Committee includes experience on matters such as conservation, restoration, natural and cultural resources, community interests, education, trails planning and construction, hydrology, agriculture, wildlife, water, management and stewardship, public administration and finance."

Currently, there are three committee positions which need appointment/reappointment. The membership term for District 4 concluded on December 31, 2016. Additionally, two at-large terms concluded on December 31, 2016.

Staff received eight applications for these positions.

Professional Bio and CV of Dave Dannenberg

Dave Dannenberg is an engineer, computer scientist and inventor. He has participated in development of semiconductor memory technologies, high performance CPUs, computing hardware for smartphones, and more recently, a breadth of mobile software and cloud computing systems spanning mobile applications to enterprise media publishing.

Dave is presently the Founder and CTO of Audible Logic. Audible Logic creates software for news media outlets that provides an engaging and immersive content experience for digital content offerings in web and mobile.

Dave is also the consulting CTO and engineering manager for Core Metabolics, a health and fitness technology company providing innovation in the field of human metabolic prediction and applying those predictions as guidance in exercise and nutrition.

In the past decade at Audible Logic, Dave has created many technologies and products to deliver news media to the growing market of mobile and handheld device users.

The start for Audible Logic was in the area of mobile audio. In 1995, the company created, marketed and sold the SelectRadio[®] mobile app, which was the leading streaming music and audio news app on the Windows Mobile platform, the first modern smartphone OS - powered Palm PDAs and early smartphones.

Dave has an in depth understanding of the complex software technologies, ecosystems and business conditions needed to build and deploy consumer facing mobile and web products.

SelectRadio was launched in the era before the ubiquitous iPhones and Androids of today where barriers to a usable mobile apps were immense. As part of the SelectRadio effort, Dave architected and developed a software technology called "Crescendo" which solved many of the early problems of mobile apps, particularly in the area of content management in an environment where network connectivity was typically spotty or nonexistent.

The software technology and expertise from Audible Logic's early work led to a client engagement with the respected news outlet – The Economist Group. For the Economist, over a multi-year span, Dave and his company provided consulting, architecture and development services that enabled the digital media offerings from that company on iPhone, Android, and other mobile platforms.

Dave is an accomplished organizational leader and engineering manager. He was trained to be an organizational leader by Intel, a company that wrote the book on engineering management and product development methodologies.

Dave held executive management, project management and engineering roles at both Intel Corporation and IBM. He was the general manager of the Internet Exchange Architecture Division at Intel, managing several hundred software engineers across multiple geographies, a multi-million dollar investment program in college research and partnerships as well as providing a CTO-like leadership role to guide acquisitions and development in Intel's networking infrastructure businesses.

Dave led the Embedded Processor Division at Intel and grew that business from 20M to 200M in the span of several years. In that role, in the then stone age era of IoT (Internet of Things), Dave's team adapted existing Personal Computer (PC) processors and created a software partnership ecosystem that opened opportunities outside of the traditional PC into retail terminal, networking infrastructure, industrial control and office equipment markets

Dave has been engaged in the smartphone universe since day one. He has the history and depth to understand every aspect of the industry. Dave is the patent holder or inventor for technologies use in smartphones today, related to messaging and form factor.

Dave contributed to the early development of mobile handhelds and smartphones. He developed the initial business engagement between Intel and Research in Motion and drove forward the high-level architecture and development efforts for an ultra-low-power, system-on-a-chip processor called "Showlow". The Showlow processor enable RIM to develop the direct predecessor to the BlackBerry, a product that demonstrated email delivery to a wireless handheld, week long use on a single battery charge and ultimately paved the way for the modern smartphone. Showlow became the first Intel product to ramp from concept to 1M units shipped in a span of less than one year, and for that the team was awarded the coveted Intel Development Award.

Dave has a completely integrated view of modern computing technology because of the breadth of his experiences. He has worked in the technology chain from transistors to circuits to systems to full blown software applications running on those systems.

Early in Dave's career, he held various engineering and project leadership roles at Intel and IBM, with many products and technologies under his belt including the first Flash memory cells developed at IBM and contribution to the first parallel execution architecture, the performance leading i960 RISC processors at Intel.

Dave graduated from Georgia Institute of Technology in 1986 with a BS in Electrical Engineering, Mathematics and specialization in semiconductor device physics. He was honored on the roles of Most Distinguished Alumni from that university in 2001.

General background

Deirdre Monroe came to New Mexico in 1995, working first for Sandia National Laboratories and then spending 20 years working at Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL). Deirdre holds a B.S. in Biology from the University of Arizona, a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from the University of Colorado, and an MBA from Cornell University. Deirdre has been an active hiker and backpacker in the Western US and Alaska, an active runner, road biker, skier, and equestrienne. Deirdre has been especially active in local New Mexico trails work, producing a multi-use, commercial map of trails of the Caja del Rio portion of the Santa Fe National Forest, co-authoring a Recreational Trails Program Grant (for 100K to establish a trailhead in the Caja del Rio), and being an active participant in the LANL Trails Working Group. In 2015, Deirdre received accolades from LANL, being nominated to the Employee Spotlight for contributions to recreational trails and for making New Mexico trails "more accessible for outdoor enthusiasts." Deirdre retired from LANL in May 2016 but remains active as a guest scientist. She was recently selected as the American Endurance Ride Conference as their New Mexico State Trail Advocate and is a strong advocate for multi-use sharing of our public lands.

Information more specific to trails advocacy.

My previous experience, i.e., that is most directly applicable to COLTPAC, has been with trail mapping, grant writing, and trailhead development in the Caja del Rio, a portion of New Mexico's Santa Fe National Forest.

- I have published a commercial trails map of the Forest Service portion of the Caja entitled: Caja del Rio Plateau: Riding, Biking and Hiking trails. The intent of this map was to stimulate knowledge and recreational use of the Caja while, at the same time, honoring and supporting traditional grazing.
- I was also instrumental in writing (with USDA Forest Service and AERC (American Endurance Ride Conference) as the principals) a 2007 RTP grant proposal for the Caja del Rio that was funded for \$100K and that has resulted in construction of the Caja Headquarters Well trailhead. This trailhead will now become an anchor point for the Camino Real trail, i.e., that trails development has continued and that the Caja trailhead is now supporting development of surrounding trails.
- Finally, I have recently retired and been designated as the American Endurance Ride Conference (AERC) New Mexico State Trails Advocate. With my local experience in the Santa Fe area in multi-use trails, with much fewer time constraints, and with the AERC trails role, I would hope, again, to provide a real and tangible contribution to the COLTPAC advisory board.

Employee Spotlight: Deirdre Monroe



If you map it, they will come

When the Weapon Systems Engineering Division's Deirdre Monroe and a horseback riding friend left her horse's boarding stable on the fringes of Santa Fe to ride west toward the Santa Fe National Forest's "Caja del Rio Unit" for the first time, she could not have imagined that the "Caja" would capture her heart so dramatically and completely as to turn her into a dedicated endurance rider, Caja advocate, trail developer and cartographer over the next 18 years.

Today, thanks in large part to Monroe's efforts, the Caja is one of Santa Fe's best high-desert plateau areas for hiking, rock climbing, mountain biking and equestrian trail riding.


“Our initial ride took place in 1997,” Monroe recalls. “It was a crystal-clear but chilly fall day as we rode out, just the two of us, over the rolling, piñon-dotted hills that are now developed as part of Santa Fe’s Las Campañas subdivision. We rode past periodic homes at first and then across nothing but open land interrupted by an occasional stock tank for cattle, which was welcome to both of us and our horses.”

Ten miles later, Monroe and her companion finally reached the eastern boundary of the Forest Service’s Caja del Rio Unit at what is now the “Headquarters Well” trailhead. At the time, they found nothing but old corrals and adobe buildings that were clearly abandoned, covered with graffiti and decaying back into the soil.

“The buildings were the ‘Pankey’ ranch headquarters during the 1930s,’ Monroe explains. “As I looked at the beautiful nearby mesas and listened to the wind, I conjured up a long-gone working cattle operation with people, working horses and cows—a bustling place that had been very alive back then.”


More than just a ride

After the first trek, Monroe thought of the Caja as nothing more than a long-distance riding option from her boarding stable until Monroe and the same friend started trailering their horses out to the Pankey ranch headquarters and began to explore the Caja itself.



View from the Caja's Chino Mesa. To the northwest across the Rio Grande are the town of White Rock and the Jemez Mountains in the distance.


“This was the turning point,” Monroe says, “both for my endurance riding and my Caja involvement. We needed to do 10- to 15- or even 20-mile horseback rides to prepare for long-distance endurance events. Since my riding friend had a truck and trailer, I tagged along pretty much wherever she wanted to go for the day. The Caja was perfect, being close to town and having a reliable water source at the abandoned ranch. Perhaps just as importantly, the Caja’s wide-open landscape refreshed me and nourished my soul.”

But Monroe and her riding partner did not have a good sense of where to go or what they would find. The Caja continued to be a remote, isolated and quite unknown “Wild West” region, except for local cattle ranchers.

The two explorers purchased U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) maps of the area, but the maps turned out to be not very accurate or complete. So, being an engineer, Monroe bought herself a Global Positioning System (GPS) device for Christmas.



Diablo Canyon (officially Caja del Rio Canyon) is a great rock climbing destination on the northern edge of the Caja. Films like "3:10 to Yuma" and "Cowboys and Aliens" were filmed in this area.

"I vividly remember riding north of the Pankey cattle operation one day," Monroe explains. "I had taken my USGS quadrangle maps, but we were riding in a location where four quads came together. I was pulling out one map and then the other, folding them on the border to try to match up the contours. Buddy, my horse, was not fussy despite being an Arabian, but the whole process was just exasperating."

Monroe wanted to find an additional method for figuring out where she was, how far she had ridden and just what connected with what. She next bought topography computer software and was on her way to becoming a map maker.

"Now I could record our rides with my GPS," Monroe notes, "dump the data into my topo system at night and occasionally have the results printed at a Santa Fe travel store for personal use."

2005 and 2014 maps


During the next few years, Monroe and her riding companion continued to explore most of the Santa Fe National Forest's roughly 67,000 "Caja del Rio Unit" acres and some of the

approximately 33,000 acres that are under the stewardship of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

By 2004, Monroe's mapmaking interests took on a life of their own and received an important boost when she conceived of and organized the American Endurance Riding Conference's first endurance ride in the Caja.

"I had no idea what I was getting into even though I had a lot of help," Monroe recalls. "Still, at that point I was the only person who really knew the Caja trails. My friend had ridden them with me, but the map project was more my cup of tea."

In addition to being a successful event, the 2004 endurance ride clarified for Monroe that a detailed, professional-quality map of the Caja was needed not just for equestrians but other users as well. She began the painstaking process of refining her personal maps by returning to the Caja many more times to verify GPS points and look for trails she might have missed before. She also met with Forest Service officials to further coordinate her project.




Monroe leads a group of Caja endurance riders.

"My first professional map, which covered only the northern Caja, was published in 2005," Monroe says, "and a much more comprehensive, 100,000-acre one in 2014, both by Otowi Crossing Press out of Los Alamos."

\$100,000

With the 2005 map as a foundation, Monroe turned her attention to the sad shape of parts of the Caja and the overall lack of trail amenities.

“Here and there illegal dumps marred the Caja’s beauty,” Monroe explains, “and people had used the Caja for target practice or as a partying place with left-behind beer cans and whiskey bottles. If we could attract more respectful and environmentally conscious outdoor users, they might edge out the troublemakers, I thought.”



Monroe also used the Caja to train her new horse, Arabian mare Sasha, for endurance competitions. Here on left during the Valles Caldera endurance ride.


Monroe began to write a “Recreational Trails Program” grant application in collaboration with the Forest Service and in the process brought together a number of seemingly unrelated interest groups, including the Northern New Mexico Cattlemen’s Association, whose members held grazing permits on the Caja del Rio Plateau.

“Our common ground was that we shared the same villains on the Caja, the dumpers and shooters and vandals,” Monroe says, “and it worked. The grant required a five-percent cash match for a \$100,000 project, and in 2007 the grant was approved, with the

American Endurance Riding Conference writing a check for \$5,000.”

In 2008, the American Trails organization presented Monroe with their State Trail Advocacy Award for New Mexico, and the next year the American Endurance Riding Conference honored her as well.


Meanwhile, the Santa Fe National Forest and BLM used the \$100,000 grant funds to install gravel parking lots, toilet facilities, map kiosks, trail signs and horse-friendly gates in the Caja. Volunteers hauled away mattresses, old TVs, and many bags of smaller trash.

Earlier this year, Santa Fe County declared Santa Fe to be an “Equestrian Destination,” and New Mexico Governor Susana Martinez signed the Rio Grande Trail Bill, which envisions a long-distance trail stretching from Colorado to Mexico and creates a commission composed of state and local governments, trail advocates and local pueblos and tribes. Depending on the Rio Grande Trail’s exact route, it might run along the base of Caja del Rio.

“Looking back, I am touched that a small personal project, and one largely based on curiosity, has created so much enthusiasm and assistance from others,” Monroe says. “People I met along the way are now some of my best and dearest friends.”


Dear Ms. Lohmann,

My interest in the Board COLTPAC position stems fundamentally from a love for hiking and exploring these wonderful desert and mountain landscapes we have in the Santa Fe area. I hold the belief that there could be a trend toward private residential and commercial development that might tend to close off or spoil the aesthetic value of more and more beautiful areas. I think we ought to ensure safe public access to as many high vista points and wetlands as possible, always with an eye toward protecting and preserving them.

I have knowledge to share about getting around to the sights out there, and would enjoy sitting down with like minded people to discuss plans for trails, as well as getting out and doing some basic preliminary photo surveys of areas of interest to the group. Let me know how I may be of help even if I'm not chosen for a Board position.

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION 2010-104 TO CLARIFY THE PROCESS
FOR APPOINTMENT OF BOARD MEMBERS

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2010, the Board of Santa Fe County Commissioners (BCC) adopted Resolution 2010-104, A RESOLUTION CREATING SANTA FE COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY BOARD; and

WHEREAS, the BCC created the Santa Fe County Housing Authority (Authority) pursuant to the New Mexico Municipal Housing Act, §3-45-1 et seq., NMSA (the Act);

WHEREAS, the Act requires the BCC to appoint all members of the Authority; and

WHEREAS, paragraphs 5 through 7 of Resolution 2010-104 lack clarity regarding appointment of Resident and Community Members to the Santa Fe County Housing Authority Board (the Authority); and

WHEREAS, paragraphs 5 through 7 of Resolution 2010-104 should be clarified to ensure compliance with the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF SANTA FE COUNTY that Resolution 2010-104 is amended as follows:

Section One. Paragraphs 5, 6, and 7 of Resolution 2010-104 are deleted entirely and replaced with the following paragraphs:

5. The BCC shall initially appoint the Community Member of the Board and he or she shall serve until January of the next even numbered year. The BCC shall initially appoint the Resident Member and he or she shall serve until January of the next odd numbered year. Thereafter, the BCC shall appoint Community Members and Resident Members for two year terms and each may only be reappointed for a total of three consecutive terms (i.e., for a total term of office of not to exceed eight (8) years).
6. If the Resident Member vacates his or her office for any reason, a notice shall be delivered to each resident living in public housing advising them of the vacancy and informing residents that are interested in serving in the position to submit a letter of interest to the Executive Director. The letters of interest received will be presented to the BCC for consideration.



7. If a Community Member vacancy occurs, a public notice will be posted in a local newspaper qualifying for the posting of legal notices. All interested parties shall submit a letter of interest to the Executive Director. The letters of interest received will be presented to the BCC for consideration.

Section Two. All provisions of Resolution 2010-104 not herein amended shall remain in full force and effect.

SUMMARY:

Chapter 3 of the SLDC gives the BCC the authority to appoint members of the Planning Commission. Section 3.3.3.1 states: "The Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, appointed by the Board. Planning Commission Members shall be registered voters of the County. One member shall reside in each of the Commission Districts in order to provide diversity of representation; the remaining members shall be at large and may reside in any area of the County and be nominated by any Commissioner." Section 3.3.3.2 goes on to state; "The initial members of the Planning Commission shall be the current members of the County Development Review Committee (CDRC), who shall serve out their remaining terms. Thereafter, terms of members of the Planning Commission shall be for two (2) years or until after their successors are appointed. Three (3) members shall be appointed in even numbered years and four (4) members shall be appointed in odd numbered years. Members shall serve for no more than three (3) consecutive terms..." (Exhibit A).

The terms of four of the current Planning Commission members will expire in January of 2017. These members represent Commission Districts 1, 3, 4, and 5. The current Planning Commission members from each of those Districts have requested reappointment as follows:

3.2.1.12. To hear and rule on appeals from discretionary decisions of the Planning Commission.

3.2.2. **Action and Appeals.** The Board shall hold public hearings and issue development orders, on applications for legislative or discretionary development approval, except where a final development order is authorized to be issued by the Planning Commission. Where the Planning Commission has authority to issue a development order determining a matter, the Board shall have appellate authority to review such development order if an appeal is properly perfected by the Administrator, the owner/applicant, or any other person or entity with standing to appeal the development order, no more than thirty (30) days from the date of the development order.

3.2.3. **Conflict of Interest: Quasi-Judicial Proceedings.** A member of the Board of County Commissioners shall not vote or participate in any discretionary development matter pending before the Board as specified in County Code of Conduct.

3.3. PLANNING COMMISSION

3.3.1. **Creation and Responsibilities.** There is hereby created a County Planning Commission ("Planning Commission") which shall have the responsibilities and duties specified in the SLDC and in NMSA 1978, § 3-19-1 *et. seq.* (1965)(as amended) and NMSA 1978, § 3-21-1 *et seq.* (1965) (as amended).

3.3.2. **Duties and Powers of the Planning Commission.** The duties and authority of the Planning Commission are as follows:

3.3.2.1. To perform the functions specified in NMSA 1978 §§ 3-19-1 and 3-21-7 (1965);

3.3.2.2. To review and recommend to the Board, for adoption, text and map amendments to the SLDC, SGMP amendments and the adoption and amendment of an Official Map, a Capital Improvement Plan ("CIP") and other programs for public improvements and services and financing;


3.3.2.3. To hold public hearings and prepare written recommendations to the Board on certain discretionary development approvals subject to appeal to the Board;

3.3.2.4. To hold public hearings and recommend action on an Area, District or Community Plan, preliminary and final development orders, and quasi-judicial discretionary development applications;

3.3.2.5. To hold public hearings and take final action and issue development orders regarding applications for variances and conditional use permits; and

3.3.2.6. To enter upon any land that is the subject of an application that is the subject of this ordinance, make examinations and surveys, and place and maintain necessary monuments and markers upon the land pursuant to NMSA 1978 § 3-19-4, upon reasonable notice of not less than seventy two (72) hours to the owner/applicant or designated agent of the land to be entered, and after adoption of an order authorizing the time, place and location of the entry onto land or site examination.

3.3.2.7. To make decisions on appeals from final decisions of the Administrator.



3.3.3. Membership and Terms.

3.3.3.1. Number; Appointments; Residency. The Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members, appointed by the Board. Planning Commission members shall be registered voters of the County. One member shall reside in each of the Commission Districts in order to provide diversity of representation; the remaining members shall be at large and may reside in any area of the County and be nominated by any Commissioner.

3.3.3.2. Terms and Removal. The initial members of the Planning Commission shall be the current members of the County Development Review Committee, who shall serve out their remaining terms. Thereafter, terms of members of the Planning Commission shall be for two (2) years or until their successors are appointed. Three (3) members shall be appointed in even numbered years and four (4) members shall be appointed in odd numbered years. Members shall serve for no more than three (3) consecutive terms. Members may be removed by the Board after a public hearing solely for reasonable cause set forth in writing and made part of the public record.

3.3.3.3. Vacancies. The Board shall appoint a person to fill a vacancy as soon as practicable after the vacancy is created.

3.3.4. Conduct of Planning Commission Business.

3.3.4.1. Officers; Quorum; Rules of Order. The Planning Commission shall follow the Rules of Order established by the Board for the conduct of meetings in the County.

3.3.4.2. Meetings. The Planning Commission shall meet at least once a month. All meetings of the Planning Commission shall be open to the public. Notice of such meetings shall be given in accordance with the applicable Board approved resolution establishing statutory notice for public meetings.

3.3.4.3. Minutes and Other Records. The County Clerk shall keep minutes of the proceedings of the Planning Commission, which shall reflect the vote on each matter put to a vote or, if a member is absent or fails to vote, reflect such fact; and such other records as are necessary to memorialize its transactions, findings, recommendations, resolutions, determinations and development orders, all of which shall be filed in the Office of the County Clerk.

3.3.4.4. Conflict of Interest. A member of the Planning Commission shall not vote or participate in any discretionary development matter pending before the Planning Commission as specified in the County Code of Conduct.

3.3.4.5. Recommendations and Development Orders. The Planning Commission shall not make a recommendation or take final action on any matter without first considering evidence received from the Administrator, planning staff, a Hearing Officer, or owner/applicant, reports of the pre-application neighborhood meeting, other persons with standing, Tribal governments, and other County, regional, state or federal departments or agencies, as determined by law.

3.4. ADMINISTRATOR.

3.4.1. Appointment. A person shall be appointed by the County Manager to serve as the Administrator. Where the SLDC assigns a responsibility to the Administrator, the Administrator may delegate that responsibility to any employee of the County.




