Each project has an indicator icon to show progress. Many projects have already been started, and several are upcoming. Highlighted projects are particular priorities in 2021. This is an ambitious list, but OSTP is up for the job!

Resource Management

- Conduct surveys on properties for bats and rare plants
- Implement monitoring and research program, including picture post installation, with trained work crews and interns
- Continue to conduct surveys on properties for wildlife and environmental conditions
- Continue to implement existing management plans
- Coordinate with Xerces Society to develop and implement a pollinator management plan
- Little Tesuque Creek Open Space Management Plan
- Talaya Hill Open Space Management Plan
- Finalize and Implement Pinyon Jay management plan
- Install border fencing on OSTP properties as needed
- OSTP staff trained in sustainable trail design and construction
- O Investigate allocating a dedicated Resource Management project budget
- Work with County emergency services to develop an emergency response plan for each property, which could include a volunteer patrol for monitoring safety of users and facilities

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PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: PINON PINE SEED PLANTING





In 2020, OSTP began implementing projects that increase climate resiliency for numerous different habitat types on our properties, especially in relation to keystone species such as the Pinyon Jay, which is one of the primary seed distributers for pinon-juniper ecosystems.

In partnership with our dedicated Master Naturalist stewards, OSTP has planted more than 1000 piñon pine seeds on open space properties (including Thornton Ranch Open Space). Each seed location was determined based upon conditions that may be more hospitable for tree growth, survival, and nut production in a changing climate; such as on north and east-facing slopes shaded from the afternoon sun, or along drainages with additional water availability. Each planting location was documented, and OSTP Master Naturalists will help monitor the success of these seeds into the future.

Many partners have taken note of these efforts, including Audubon Southwest, and now plan to recreate this project in parts of Arizona, and additional locations in New Mexico.

You can see above that all planting was done in small groups and with social distancing guidelines in mind.

PROPERTY HIGHLIGHT ORTIZ MOUNTAINS OPEN SPACE

Santa Fe County Board of County Commissioners adopted the Ortiz Mountains Open Space Management Plan in 2019. In 2020, implementation of this plan (and the associated forest health management plan) has gained momentum in partnership with SFC Wildland Fire, Ecotone Landscape Planning and the Forest Stewards Guild.

The Ortiz Mountains Open Space is home to many rapidly declining bird species dependent upon ponderosa pine forest, including the Grace's Warbler. To ensure habitat is improved for these high priority species, bird surveys were conducted pre-management, and will continue for many years post-management. The results from these surveys will allow us to adaptively manage our properties and provide optimum benefits for these species.

The Ortiz Mountains Open Space is a unique landscape in Santa Fe County and this project will enhance the forest and wildlife diversity, in keeping with the vision of the property. This project is intended to enhance climate resiliency of the mountains forests, and enhance habitat for many species of conservation need.

Santa Fe County Wildland Fire Crew have begun the forest treatments and will continue this important work throughout the winter, as well as next fall and winter. Their efforts are consistent with the forest health plan which was developed to balance the need for habitat enhancement and hazard mitigation.



COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT: MASTER NATURALIST PROGRAM

COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT: THE XERCES SOCIETY FOR INVERTEBRATE CONSERVATION

The third annual Master Naturalist Course looked a little different this year. The program shifted to a virtual learning format due to the global pandemic. But that allowed almost 40 interested naturalists to sign up and participate in a 12 week course filled with a wide variety of speakers and topics.

This ongoing partnership with Randall Davey Audubon and Santa Fe Botanical Garden was enhanced by the addition of 2 Youth Conservation Corps members who facilitated this group of learners.

Graduates of this program will be conducting valuable services on Santa Fe County Open Spaces including helping to monitor natural resources and on-going studies.

OSTP has worked to strengthen many partnerships with groups who have similar missions. This year, the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation and Santa Fe County have worked together to develop several initiatives to enhance pollinator habitat, provide guidance on landscape management, and provide education to community members in Santa Fe County

This partnership will continue in 2021 in developing Bee City USA certifications with the City of Santa Fe and Randall Davey Audubon, as well as developing a pollinator management plan specific to Santa Fe County Open Space and Trails Properties.
