Dear Accountable Entities, Pueblos, Tribes, and Nations Leadership,

The Behavioral Health Executive Committee (BHEC) approved the following process for the Tribal Priority Plans on Friday, August 14, 2026, effective immediately.

Tribal Priority Plan Process

Tribal Priority Plans should be developed and approved in accordance with each Pueblo, Tribe, or Nation's respective processes and requirements. Following completion of the applicable tribal process, the plan will follow the following process:



1. Tribal Priority Plan Submitted to HCA

PTN submits its Tribal Priority Plan for the tribal set-aside as an Addendum to the Regional Plan directly to HCA, including the Accountable Entity (AE) and the Administrative Office of the Courts.

2. HCA Sends Tribal Priority Plan to Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) for Review

HCA routes the tribal priority plan to relevant SMEs to ensure alignment with the regional plan and BH standards as set forth by HCA. HCA will send the review to the BHEC for review, feedback, and eventual vote.

3. BHEC Votes to Approve, Conditionally Approve, or Modify

BHEC reviews the subject matter expert (SME)-vetted plan and votes to either approve it outright or conditionally approve it pending clarification or modification.

Tribal Participation in Behavioral Health Reform and Investment Act (BHRIA)

While there are no statutory requirements or guidance for tribal participation in BHRIA, the following approaches have emerged through practice as the primary mechanisms by which tribes have had the opportunity to engage in the planning process. Tribal Partners may elect to:

1. **Sign onto the Regional Plan.** PTNs may join the Regional Plan as a signatory, formally agreeing with the collective goals, strategies, and priorities of the region. The PTNs are able to apply for, and potentially receive, funding through the AE.
2. **Submit a Tribal Priority Plan as an Addendum to the Regional Plan.** PTNs may develop and submit a Tribal Priority Plan to be appended to the Regional Plan, ensuring Tribe-specific projects are formally documented and incorporated into the Regional Plan. A Tribal Priority Plan must tie to the Region's identified priorities. This process will allow for the BHEC to review and approve the Tribal Priority Plan and subsequently disburse the set-aside funding.
3. **Sign onto the Regional Plan and Submit a Tribal Priority Plan.** PTNs may pursue both avenues simultaneously—joining the Regional Plan as a signatory while also submitting a Tribal Priority Plan as an addendum to access the tribal set-aside allocation—thereby participating in the broader regional effort while preserving a distinct record of Tribal-specific priorities that are in alignment with the regional priorities.
4. **Elect Not to Participate at This Time.** PTNs may choose not to participate in BHRIA at present. This decision does not preclude future involvement; the option to participate remains available, although existing legislative appropriations for BHRIA are subject to reversion dates pursuant to [House Bill 2](#).
