





PETROGLYPH HILL *at* *Thornton Ranch Open Space*





Thornton Ranch Open Space is located between the Galisteo Creek and County Road 42 (Camino los Abuelos) in central Santa Fe County.

The entrance to the property is approximately 4 miles west of the village of Galisteo, and 5.5 miles east of State Road 14 (Turquoise Trail) on county Road 42.

Thornton Ranch Open Space is currently closed to the public pending a management plan and trails construction.

Docent lead tours of Petroglyph Hill have been scheduled for Calendar Year 2014 through the Santa Fe County Planning Division, Open Space and Trails Planner. All 2014 tours are full, and there is a waiting list.



The Open Space and Trails Program at Santa Fe County is grateful to the many volunteers who are serving as site stewards and docents for the rich cultural resource at Petroglyph Hill. County staff will continue to work with the land management agencies and volunteers who have offered to help in planning, interpretation and management of the additional 23 sites that are part of the Galisteo Basin Archaeological Sites Protection Act of 2004. Santa Fe County is currently under contract with consultants for the completion of cultural resources investigations and the creation of a management plan and master plan for the property.
